Seventy-five years ago VACo held its first Annual Conference in Lynchburg at the Virginian Hotel. Twenty-four counties answered the roll call. The year was 1934, the middle of the Great Depression, an era marked by the harshest economic conditions in this country's history. From that difficult birth VACo has grown to become a proud and respected organization that serves all of Virginia's 95 counties. It is a strong, articulate voice through which county governments in Virginia speak. VACo has also become the chief means for county officials--regardless of party affiliations, county population, or county location--to gather and discuss with one another the challenges we face in serving our citizens.

As county officials we have reached a historic milestone when the exchange of ideas among us has never been more important. In planning this year's Conference, VACo's Conference Planning Committee and staff have worked diligently to develop a program that will provide important information about the state budget, broadband, health-care, emergency preparedness, improving energy efficiency, land use regulation, regional cooperation and economic development.

Monday morning's opening session promises to be informative. Former VACo president and current Congressman Gerry Connolly will be the keynote speaker. Dr. Robert Holsworth, a political commentator, will headline Tuesday morning. In various conference events we will be joined by key members of the General Assembly who have graciously agreed to engage in panel discussions about many pressing issues that concern county officials. We greatly appreciate their participation.

As you attend this year's conference please take time to visit our exhibitors in the Exhibit Hall. There are more than 100 companies and organizations ready to serve the interests of county governments. Please thank them for their support of our conference.

Over the past year, it has been an honor serving as your president. I look forward to thanking each one of you for your service to local government and to VACo.

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About the development and adoption of VACo's annual legislative program

1. Spring regional meetings: In even number years VACo members are invited to attend regional meetings to identify and discuss key statewide legislative and policy issues.

2. Three Resolutions Committee meetings: The committee oversees the development of the annual Legislative Program. The meetings occur in the spring after the regional meetings, early fall, and during the annual conference in November. The committee receives regular legislative updates, via conference call, during the regular legislative session in the winter.

The Resolutions Committee includes the six members of VACo's Executive Committee and the chairs and vice chairs of VACo's eight steering committees. VACo's First Vice President chairs the committee. The eight steering committees are Administration of Government, Community Planning and Development, Education, Environment and Agriculture, Finance, Health and Human Services, Telecommunications and Utilities, and Transportation.

3. Steering Committees meet at least twice: Late summer and November during the annual conference.

The Steering Committees develop their policy sections of the annual Legislative Program.

4. The membership is asked to adopt the new legislative program during the annual business meeting. The meeting occurs on the last day of the annual conference in November.

Additional information

The President appoints steering committee chairs and vice chairs. VACo members volunteer to serve on steering committees.

In early October, prior to the annual conference, the membership receives a Preliminary Legislative Program. This draft is revised during the annual conference.

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
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Conference Info

Teresa Altemus has been active with NACo for more than a decade. She is chair of the NACo Finance Committee and is Executive Committee Liaison to the Information Technology Committee, the Conference Advisory Committee and the Deferred Compensation Committee. In 1993, Altemus became the first woman and the youngest person ever elected to the Gloucester County Board of Supervisors. She is in her fifth term.

Gerry E. Connolly was elected to the House of Representatives in 2008. Prior to his election as a member of Congress he served as Chair of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors. Before his election as Chair in 2002, he served as a member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors for nine years. Congressman Connolly served as VACo's president between 2004 and 2005. As a freshman member of the House of Representatives he was appointed to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs; the House Committee on Oversight and Reform; and the House Committee on the Budget.

Bob Goodlatte began his ninth term in 2009. During his time in Congress, Bob has made a name for himself as a leader on Internet and high-tech issues. He is Co-Chair of the Congressional Internet Caucus, and Chairman of the House Republican High Technology Working Group. In January 2009, Bob was elected to serve as the Vice Ranking Member on the House Judiciary Committee. He has been an active member of the House Judiciary Committee since arriving in Congress. Bob serves on the Courts and Competition Policy Subcommittee and the Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security Subcommittee.

Because of the recession, Gov. Kaine and the General Assembly have reduced state revenue projections and enacted significant budget reductions. The new governor and General Assembly will continue to cut programs and spending. State budget decisions affect 95 county budgets: 50 percent of the state's general tax revenues are appropriated to local governments for state mandated services including K-12 public education.

The panelists represent two of the three state statutory budget actors: The Office of the Governor and the Senate of Virginia. Gov. Kaine will introduce his proposed 2010-2012 biennial budget in Dec. The new governor and General Assembly are charged with adopting the final budget next spring. The panel will discuss revenue and budget proposals and decisions including those impacting local governments.

are energy sources that are naturally replenished. During the 2009 session, the General Assembly passed several bills relating to renewable energy. Renewable energy sources have become an important part of many utilities' plans for meeting their customers' electricity needs. Use of wind power is growing at an annual rate of 30 percent.

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
