Stormwater a Hot Issue during 2017 General Assembly Session

<u>HB 1774 (Hodges)</u> is a complex stormwater bill that is likely to undergo some significant changes before it is presented to the <u>Chesapeake Subcommittee</u> of the House Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources Committee. As introduced, HB 1774 allows local governments that "opt out" of managing their own stormwater programs to establish a "rural development growth area" (RDGA) where land erosion and sediment control requirements would be conformed to MS-19 regulations.

For localities in Planning District 18, the bill authorizes the establishment of a Regional Stormwater Practices Bank (RSP). Perhaps the bill's most significant provision requires the State Water Control Board to "administer all Virginia programs for erosion control and stormwater management for portions of such a locality except those areas that are designated as RDGA." This provision appears to close the so-called "donut hole" problem for counties that chose to "opt out" of managing local stormwater programs under <u>HB 1173 (Hodges)</u> and <u>SB 423 (Hanger)</u> that passed the General Assembly back in 2014.

The "donut hole" is an unintended loophole created by the aforementioned 2014 legislation that requires "opt out" localities to perform stormwater functions for land disturbances between 2,500 square feet to an acre in areas covered by the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act (CBPA); and land disturbances between 10,000 square feet and one acre in areas not subject to CBPA. One of VACo's chief objectives in the 2017 General Assembly Session is to close the "donut hole."

VACo is working in support of HB 1774. The bill has attracted much attention not only from VACo but from such other diverse groups as the Chesapeake Bay Foundation and the Homebuilders Association of Virginia.

Delegate Keith Hodges is also sponsoring <u>HB 2009 (Hodges)</u>, which authorizes local governments managing their local stormwater programs (or "opt in" localities) to hire

certified third-party professionals to administer any or all aspects of their respective stormwater programs and erosion and sediment control programs. On January 18, HB 2009 was unanimously reported by the <u>Chesapeake Subcommittee</u> of the House Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources Committee. VACo testified in support of HB 2009.

VACo will continue to report on the progress of all significant stormwater bills that the General Assembly will consider this session.

More Harmful Freedom of Information Act Bills Introduced

Delegate Rick Morris submitted two measures dealing with FOIA that will affect local governments. <u>HB 2401 (Morris)</u> mandates that minutes be taken in all closed meetings and also provides that audio recordings of all closed meetings be made. The bill is silent as to who can access these notes and recordings and what process can be used to access them. This bill will have a chilling effect on appropriate discussions in closed meetings and concerns about secure storage, archiving and access to these materials.

<u>HB 2402 (Morris)</u> provides that if the court finds that any officer or employee of a public body receives a request for records that was sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and without legal excuse or justification, deliberately, willfully, and knowingly fails to make a response to such request, such officer or employee may be terminated for cause by his appointing authority or agency head.

These bills will be heard Thursday, January 26, in <u>House General Laws</u> <u>Subcommittee 2</u>.

Key Dates for 2017 General Assembly Session

- **January 11:** General Assembly convenes at noon. Prefiled legislation must be submitted by 10 a.m.; this is also the last day to file bills dealing with the Virginia Retirement System or legislation creating or continuing a study.
- **January 13:** Budget amendments by General Assembly members must be submitted by 5 p.m.
- January 20: All bills must be filed by 3 p.m.
- **February 5:** The Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committees must report their respective budgets.
- **February 7:** Crossover (deadline for legislation to pass its chamber of origin)
- February 9: Deadline for each chamber to complete work on its budget
- **February 20:** Deadline for committee action on legislation
- February 25: Scheduled adjournment sine die
- April 5: Reconvened session to consider the Governor's amendments and vetoes
