VACo opposes bill to curb local authority for the provision of broadband services

A legislative proposal by the Virginia Cable Telecommunications Association (VCTA) would impose an additional set of significant requirements (beyond those currently required by law) and burdensome limitations for a locality or municipal authority to bring broadband to unserved areas, particularly in rural parts of the state.

Many VACo members have invested time, resources, and expense for the deployment of broadband to serve schools, businesses, and residential areas. HB 2108 (Byron), if passed, could halt these efforts and potentially bar future initiatives. Two of the most troubling aspects of the bill relate to financing and planning. First, the bill states a locality shall not "... provide loans, or issue notes or bonds, or facilitate the construction of facilities, to provide communication services...." The core foundation of the municipal broadband authorities being created in Virginia is the ability to leverage public investment, including existing infrastructure, to provide coverage where it currently does not exist. Second, the Virginia Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), provides an exemption for a local governing body to hold discussions with commercial internet service providers for the creation of potential public-private partnerships to serve communities.

The bill, as drafted, would require such discussions be open to the public. This change in policy will effectively limit the willingness of private internet service providers to explore and potentially partner successfully with localities to provide broadband.

Further analysis of the bill will continue to determine other aspects that impact local authority, and VACo will provide updates including any calls to action for contacting legislators. Stay tuned.

Charter School Constitutional Amendments Introduced

HJ 629 (Bell, R.B.) and SJ 240 (Obenshain) would allow the state Board of Education to establish charter schools, subject to criteria and conditions that the General Assembly would prescribe. Currently this power rests with local school boards.

VACo has historically opposed such measures because they would allow a state body to make decisions that are more appropriately handled locally, potentially including decisions about the use of local school funding dollars, depending upon how a charter school would be structured under the "criteria and conditions" the General Assembly would dictate.

HJ 629 has been assigned to the <u>House Privileges and Elections Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments</u> and was heard on January 16. VACo spoke in opposition to the measure. No vote was taken at the subcommittee meeting, as the full committee chairman has directed the subcommittee to hear testimony on all constitutional amendments before deciding which measures to recommend to the full committee. The subcommittee has been asked to forward no more than four amendments. SJ 240 has been assigned to the <u>Senate Privileges and Elections</u>. <u>Committee</u>.

Constitutional Amendments of Interest to Localities Introduced

In addition to two measures regarding charter schools (discussed in the above article), a number of constitutional amendments of interest to localities have been introduced.

Prior to being placed before the voters in a statewide referendum, constitutional amendments must pass twice in identical form, once before a House of Delegates election and once afterwards. The Chairman of the House Privileges and Elections Committee has directed the Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments to hear testimony on all amendments in its next several meetings prior to deciding on a limited number (no more than four) to advance to the full committee.

Among the Constitutional amendments under consideration are several making changes to existing property tax exemptions. <u>HJ 562</u>. (<u>Miyares</u>) and <u>HJ 697 (Byron</u>) modify the exemption for the surviving spouses of disabled veterans, which currently provides that the spouse must continue to occupy the real property for which the exemption was originally granted. Under HJ 562 and HJ 697, the exemption would apply to the spouse's principal place of residence without restriction on the spouse relocating. The fiscal impact on localities is difficult to determine, as some surviving spouses may be "downsizing" to smaller residences, while others may be moving to larger properties. <u>SJ 284</u>. (<u>Stuart</u>) would expand the property tax exemption for surviving spouses of service members who are killed in action to include widows and widowers of service members who die in combat zones.

Two additional measures provide for local options for tax reductions. <u>HJ 577 (Cole)</u> would allow localities to reduce the assessed value of property abutting parcels on which local public improvements have been made, if these improvements would otherwise result in a significant increase in the fair market value of the property. The reduction would end when the property was sold or the owner died. <u>HJ 706 (Rush)</u> would allow a local governing body to provide for an exemption from personal property taxes for tangible personal property that is valued at \$5,000 or less and used in a business.

HJ 634 (Cole) would allow the General Assembly to authorize an elected school board to tax real property in the school division.

The House measures have been referred to the <u>House Privileges and Elections Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments</u> where they were heard on January 16. A decision on whether to recommend that the amendments be considered by the full committee will be made at an upcoming meeting, likely January 30. The Senate measure will be heard by the <u>Senate Privileges and Elections Committee</u>.

Governor McAuliffe Announces Record Attendance for Virginia State Parks in 2016

RICHMOND – Governor Terry McAuliffe today announced that Virginia State Parks attendance in 2016 hit a record-high 10,022,698 visitors, which was a 12 percent increase over 2015. Virginia State Parks, managed by the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), hosted more than 1 million overnight visitors in cabins and campgrounds in 2016, an increase of nearly 3 percent over 2015.

"Virginia's state park system is the best in the country, and more Virginians and visitors are taking advantage than ever before," said Governor McAuliffe. "State Parks are a vital part of communities large and small, attracting visitors to the region and generating substantial tourism revenue that directly benefits our local economies. From opening Natural Bridge State Park to making historic investments in the Virginia Treasures Program, this administration has worked hard to protect and expand opportunities to interact with the countless natural and historic attractions our Commonwealth has to offer. I want to thank the staff at the Department of Conservation and Recreation for their hard work making our state park system a world-class asset for the people of Virginia."

"When attendance increases, so does the economic impact of the state park system," said Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation Director Clyde Cristman. "Visitors spend money in the parks, in local communities and traveling to and from parks. Our 37 state parks have an impact of more than \$222 million on Virginia's economy."

"Multiple factors contributed to our new attendance record, overall good weather, lower gas prices and the year-long celebration of our 80th anniversary," said Virginia State Parks Director Craig Seaver. "Last year, a record-high 548,398 people attended our ranger-led environmental and historic programs, an increase of 23 percent over 2015. So there's no single cause we can point to as a reason for the increases. It's obvious that more people find value spending time in a Virginia State Park."

The addition of Natural Bridge State Park, which is in Rockbridge County, accounted for 45,869 visitors since DCR assumed management on September 24, 2016. The increases also came despite the fact that several parks in the Tidewater and Northern Neck regions were closed for weeks because of hurricanes. The storms negatively affected their visitation, overnight attendance and revenue.
