## **Prince William County hires Chief Information Officer**

Following a nationwide search and competitive hiring process, the Board of County Supervisors announced that Robert Mancini will head the county's Department of Information Technology as the new Chief Information Officer.

Mancini brings with him 30 years of experience in the field of information technology, with 12 of those years in local government. He most recently served as Chief Information Officer for Lexington Technology, where he provided leadership and recovery services to the organization, including developing and executing a critical turnaround plan for the IT division, negotiating service contracts and introducing service level agreements and initiating programs that increased productivity while reducing attrition.

Before that, Mancini served as the Chief Technology Officer for the D.C. government, where he developed strategies and oversaw all technology services for the organization. While there, he created the Digital Inclusion Initiative to expand access to broadband services in underserved areas of D.C., developed the D.C. Centralized Technology Procurement team and developed strategic public-private partnerships with several cybersecurity entities, among other successful initiatives.

"Robert Mancini brings a great deal of experience and expertise to Prince William County," said Corey A. Stewart, Chairman of the Prince William Board of County Supervisors. "He has implemented several successful technology programs in the public and private sectors alike, and we are confident that he will serve our community and the organization well."

Mancini received a Master of Science degree in Information Systems from Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania and a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration with a minor in Mathematics from Radford University.

### **Prince William County names Parks and Recreation Director**

Following a nationwide search and competitive hiring process, the Board of County Supervisors announced that Seth Hendler-Voss is the new Parks and Recreation Director for Prince William County.

Hendler-Voss comes to Prince William County from Canton, NC, where he served as the Town Manager. While there, he led several successful parks and recreation initiatives and community development programs, raised more than \$3 million in private donations and grants and obtained a \$350,000 grant from the North Carolina Parks and Recreation Trust Fund.

Previously, Hendler-Voss worked as the Principal Landscape Architect and then the Planning and Development Manager for the City of Asheville's Parks and Recreation Department. Before that, he worked as the Principal Landscape Architect for the City of Atlanta's Office of Park Design.

"The Board is very excited about the hire of Seth Hendler-Voss," said Corey A. Stewart,

Chairman of the Prince William Board of County Supervisors. "He brings a great deal of experience in local government, including as a previous director of parks and recreation, which gives him a unique understanding and perspective of government operations at all levels."

# Local Fiscal Stress 'Early Warning System' Discussed

On April 11, a working group convened by Martha Mavredes, the Auditor of Public Accounts, met to discuss the development of an "early warning system" for localities in fiscal distress. This meeting was a continuation of discussions held last year and responds to language in the state budget directing the creation of a set of criteria to identify localities in financial trouble.

Staff from the Pew Charitable Trusts briefed attendees on approaches taken by other states to identify and respond to local fiscal stress. States are using a variety of methods to identify localities in financial trouble and take differing approaches to state intervention in local affairs, ranging from limited technical support to state approval of the issuance of local debt. Indicators used by states to flag potentially troubled localities include levels of debt per capita, liquidity, tax revenue per capita and on-time filing of required audits, among other factors. Some states include "environmental" factors as well, such as poverty rates, reliance on a single industry, or changes in population.

The workgroup will reconvene in the coming months to review sample models using historical data from Virginia localities. The best method to present the results of such modeling will also be discussed; Ms. Mavredes expressed a preference to provide contextual information along with raw data, as there are economic development concerns associated with designating a locality as distressed.

VACo will continue to participate in the workgroup and will keep members apprised of future developments.

# State General Fund Revenues Up in March

State General Fund revenue collections continued their strong performance for another month, rising 5.7 percent in March. On a fiscal year-to-date basis, total GF revenue collections grew 4.6 percent, ahead of the 2.9 percent annual growth forecast. Growth in March was driven primarily by individual income tax withholding, which comprises 63 percent of total GF revenues and grew 6.8 percent this month. Year-to-date individual withholding receipts have grown by 5.3 percent; the forecast for this category is 3.6 percent growth.

As was the case in February, sales tax revenues grew, but continue to lag the annual estimate. Adjusted for the accelerated sales tax program, revenues have grown by 1.6 percent on a year-to-date basis; the annual forecast projects 2.7 percent growth.

Governor McAuliffe noted in his statement that although the last three months of the fiscal year are significant months for revenue collections (with estimated and final income tax payments due from corporations and individuals in April and May and estimated payments due again in June), the healthy collections thus far provide the state with a "cushion" in meeting the official revenue forecast. # Governor's Secure Commonwealth Initiative HHR Sub-Panel Meets

The Health and Human Resources Sub-Panel of the Governor's Secure Commonwealth Initiative met in Henrico County on April 7. Among other briefings, a major topic of discussion was the state's response to the opioid epidemic. The Virginia Department of Health (VDH) has convened a task force with a three-part response to the epidemic: preventing new cases of addiction through such methods as reducing the number of prescriptions written for opioids; screening and treating new cases, such as babies born with neonatal abstinence syndrome; and reducing harm involved with drug use, through methods such as improving access to naloxone and testing for diseases associated with injected drug use, such as Hepatitis C.

In addition, the 2017 General Assembly authorized the Commissioner of Health to create local or regional harm reduction programs that may include syringe exchange programs under certain circumstances.

A helpful reference for localities is the <u>Virginia Opioid Addiction Indicators dashboard</u>, which displays data on overdose deaths, administration of naloxone and reported cases of HIV and Hepatitis C by locality, health district, or Virginia State Police Region, among other categories. The dashboard is available on the <u>VDH website</u>.

VDH staff also briefed attendees on preparations underway to respond to the Zika virus. An outreach campaign is underway to encourage members of the public to "tip, toss, and cover" – *tip* and empty containers of standing water and *toss* out items such as old tires to eliminate areas for Zika-carrying mosquitoes to breed and *cover* exposed skin when outside; using mosquito repellent is also encouraged. VDH is working to contract with mosquito control vendors to supplement local mosquito control efforts in case Virginia experiences local transmission of the virus. VDH staff also provided an overview of the main federal grants that provide public health emergency preparedness funding in Virginia, the Hospital Preparedness Program and the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program. These grants fund a variety of emergency preparedness activities, such as tabletop exercises and the purchase of protective equipment for first responders. The State Health Commissioner, Dr. Marissa Levine, noted that Virginia has used this funding to build a strong capacity to respond to emergencies, but cautioned that this response system is dependent upon federal funds and is vulnerable to potential reductions in federal spending.

On September 11, 2001, terrorists hijacked a plane and flew it into the Pentagon, our nation's military headquarters, and killed 184 federal employees, military personnel, civilians and flight crew. The victims – men, women, and children – ranged in age from three to seventy-one, and represented a cross-section of America. The physical damage to the Pentagon was rebuilt in less than one year, but the attacks forever changed our world.

To preserve the memories of those lost and the day's tremendous significance in our nation's history, the Pentagon Memorial Fund, Inc. was formed to raise the necessary funds to build a simple but meaningful memorial near the site of the attack for all to visit. The Pentagon Memorial Fund is also dedicated to developing educational resources and outreach opportunities to help visitors understand the historic significance of the site and the events that occurred on September 11, 2001.

In 2003, a large cross-section of corporations, countries and individuals – including family members of the victims, former presidents and first ladies, members of Congress, former military leaders, people from across America and the world – joined together in support of the Pentagon Memorial Fund. With this united effort, the Pentagon Memorial was dedicated on September 11, 2008, the first of the three national 9/11 memorials to be dedicated in this country.

Since opening to the public, research has shown that there is a unique teachable moment at the Memorial to explain the events at the Pentagon on 9/11, the stories of the victims and heroes; the role of the Department of Defense and Pentagon; and how the United States and governments around the world are working together to prevent future attacks.

### VARINA AREA LIBRARY RECEIVES NATIONAL DESIGN AWARD

The Varina Area Library in Henrico County, Virginia receives a national design award from the American Institute of Architects and American Library Association.

The American Institute of Architects (AIA) and American Library Association (ALA) announced the winners of the 2017 Library Building Awards.

The AIA and the American Library Association/Library Leadership and Management Association annually recognize excellence in library planning and design. The Varina Area Library, designed by BCWH in Richmond, VA in collaboration with Tappé Architects in Boston, MA, was one of eight American and European libraries to receive this year's prestigious Library Building Award.

The Library, which opened on June 1, 2016, is a new 43,000 square foot building located on a 22 acre parcel of land in the rural, eastern section of Henrico County, Virginia. The new state-of the art-library replaces a small 6,000 square foot branch that served the Varina community for over 40 years.

The design of the Library reflects and reinforces the unique, local culture and history of the Varina district. The building and materials are reminiscent of the agrarian structures that once populated the area, borrowing on the form of a tobacco barn. The Library is configured to be a series of three pavilions emerging from and cascading down the site toward a protected wetland area. Both the interior and exterior materials are inspired by those found recurrently in the surrounding community. The end of each pavilion is enclosed by expansive glass walls that maximizes views, allowing natural light to bathe the interior. The project is designed to achieve LEED Silver Certification.

Configured for adaptability, the spatial connections between the Teen Collection, Collaboration Zone and Digital Media Lab allow the spaces to flex over the course of a day to accommodate emerging entrepreneurs, seniors, teens and tech-savvy patrons. At the opposite end of the Library, the Silent Study pavilion is immersed in daylight and the natural environment surrounds patrons who desire a place for focused concentration. The Children's Collection has a "floating" story and craft pavilion that is accented with pops of color in which children can access through a great "barn door." Spilling from the Welcome Zone to the Reading Landing, cascading seating steps become an informal amphitheater when the oversized screen lowers in front of the two-story glass wall that frames the woods and walking trails.

### Donald Robertson Isle of Wight County Assistant County Administrator



Q1. You wear several hats in addition to your role as Assistant County Administrator, serving also as the Director of Information Resources and Legislative Affairs for Isle of Wight County since 2006. How has working with the media changed since you've served in that role?

**Don Robertson:** Actually, I have been working with the media since I started with the County in 1990. The thing that has changed most is the way I interact with the media. When I first started in local government, all of my interactions with the media were either face-to-face or via the telephone. Now, in addition to those modes of communication, I spend an equal amount of time, if not more, communicating with reporters via email and text messaging.

### Q2. How do you keep up with the news? What media sources do you read, watch, or listen to regularly?

**DR:** I spend time each day reviewing a variety of news sources. Typically, I will watch CNN and the local TV news before I leave home. I check several websites daily, such as <u>MSN.com</u>, <u>CNN.com</u>, <u>USATODAY.com</u>, <u>Pilotonline.com</u>, <u>Richmond.com</u>, <u>Roanoke.com</u>, <u>Tidewaternews.com</u>, <u>DailyPress.com</u> and <u>SmithfieldTimes.com</u> to stay abreast of any issues impacting the County.

#### Q3. You've also been the County's Human Resources Director. What qualities do you look for when hiring?

**DR:** Like most everyone, I want to be sure that the person has the appropriate education and employment experience for the position we are attempting to fill, but I also like to get a feel for the person's work ethic. We have an awesome team of employees in Isle of Wight, so I look for the person who is going to be excited about being a part of our team, learning new things each day, and getting things accomplished.

Q4. In addition to your Master's in Public Administration, you hold a degree in communications studies from Virginia Tech and you worked as an electrician for Newport News Shipbuilding earlier in your career. How does your background influence your current work?

DR: When I was at Virginia Tech, I took a class called "Physics as a Liberal Art." It gave me some great insights on the power of being able to explain very technical information to people with non-technical backgrounds and vice versa. I am always looking for opportunities to bridge the communications between staff and citizens because the things that seem so obvious to us are sometimes mysteries to the people we serve.

Q5. What drew you to working in local government? How did you make the transition from the private sector to county administration? DR: When I left college, I really didn't know that much about local government. I was working in the private sector, as an Apprentice Electrician in the shipbuilding industry. The pay was great, but I knew it wasn't what I wanted to do for the next 30 years, so I took a couple of graduate school classes in Public Administration. I think I got into an argument with one of my professors on the first night of my first class, but I was hooked. I knew I wanted to work in local government and specifically, I wanted to serve in Isle of Wight County so I could contribute to the community that I grew up in. I began pursuing opportunities in local government and when a position opened in Isle of Wight County I applied, but I did not get the position. I met with the County Administrator and talked to others in the organization to determine how I could better prepare myself for future opportunities and when that same position became available a couple years later, I applied again and was offered the position.

#### Q6. What challenges and opportunities do you see facing Isle of Wight County in the near future?

**DR:** Isle of Wight County is challenged with addressing the needs and expectations of a growing community while maintaining its rural character. Many of our newest residents have moved from urban and suburban communities to enjoy the rural ambiance offered by our community, but their expectations of rural life are not always consistent with their more long-term neighbors. The growth we are experiencing represents an opportunity for diversification of our economic development portfolio and it also provides an opportunity for the expansion and provision of needed services and infrastructure in areas of our community where it would not have been possible.

#### Q7. What do you do for fun?

**DR:** Since my wife and I are now "empty-nesters" we really enjoy spending quiet time at home together or going out for a good meal and great conversation.

# Henrico County names Chip England to lead public utilities department



Henrico County Manager John A. Vithoulkas has appointed Chip B. England to serve as director of the Department of Public Utilities (DPU), effective Monday, May 15.

England currently works as the director of the Department of Engineering and Utilities for Prince George County. He will succeed Arthur D. Petrini, who is retiring from the position. Petrini has led Henrico's DPU since 2001.

As director, England will head an agency with more than 300 employees and a budget of nearly \$84.7 million for the 2017 fiscal year. DPU provides drinking water and wastewater services to more than 95,000 customers. In addition, the agency provides refuse collection and recycling services and manages the Keep Henrico Beautiful program. DPU also oversees the Cobbs Creek Reservoir regional water supply project, currently under construction in Cumberland County.

Prior to his service with Prince George County, England worked as a deputy director of public works for Hanover County and served as an assistant division director of the water treatment facility for Henrico DPU, a post he held from 2002 to 2011.

England earned a bachelor's degree from the United States Military Academy at West Point. He received a master of business administration degree from Averett University and completed coursework in the master of civil engineering program at Virginia Tech. He is a registered professional engineer with the Commonwealth of Virginia.


