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State proposes model to grade Counties on their fiscal health



Budget language adopted in 2017 directs the Auditor of Public Accounts (APA), Martha S. Mavredes, to establish a work group to develop an "early warning system" for localities in fiscal distress. This system is intended to allow the state to flag certain localities determined to be in financial trouble for certain follow-up actions, including potential state intervention. Ms. Mavredes held a meeting with the workgroup on July 31 to unveil a proposed model to evaluate local fiscal stress; this tool is based on Louisiana's Financial Assessment Model (FAM) and uses factors such as a locality's ratio of reserves relative to its liabilities and its sufficiency of reserves relative to its General Fund revenue. APA staff ran data from localities' Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports from Fiscal Years 2014, 2015, and 2016 through the model to generate sample scores. These scores, as well as information on the ratios used in the model, were circulated to county administrators for review this week.

As envisioned by the APA, if a locality's FAM score fell below a certain threshold, the APA would follow up with a questionnaire that would probe certain qualitative factors affecting a locality's financial situation, such as whether a locality was delinquent in making required contributions to the Virginia Retirement System or experienced any significant problems in collecting receivables in the current or prior fiscal year. The draft questionnaire also asks whether "external factors," such as unfunded mandates or a change in the local economy, affected the locality's budget. The draft questionnaire was also circulated to county administrators for review.

A challenge facing the workgroup is addressing the potential unintended consequences of encapsulating a locality's financial situation, which may be affected by factors outside its control, in a numerical score. Members of the workgroup are in agreement that contextual information will be important in making determinations about local fiscal stress.

Counties are encouraged to review the proposed model and questionnaire to determine whether they will present an accurate picture of a locality's financial health.

Fairfax County Park Authority ExecutiveDirector Kirk Kincannon has been appointed Acting County Executive by the Board of Supervisors, effective September 16. Kincannon will serve in the position until a permanent appointment is made. County Executive Ed Long retires on September 15.

Kincannon has been Executive Director of the Fairfax County Park Authority since January 2014, overseeing a three-time National Gold Medal award-winning agency and recognized national leader in environmental stewardship, historic and natural resource preservation, park and recreation facility design, innovation, inclusive programs and innovation. The Park Authority includes 425 parks encompassing over 23,000 acres of parkland, historic properties, recreation centers, golf courses and nature centers.

Kincannon previously served as Director of Parks and Recreation for the City of Boulder,
CO. He was the City of Alexandria's Director of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Activities for five years and deputy director for four years. He is a native of Fairfax County.

Long announced his retirement in early May. He has served as the county's administrative leader since April 2012 and has worked for Fairfax County for almost 40 years, including as Director of the Department of Management and Budget and Deputy County Executive/Chief Financial Officer.

Commonwealth Transportation Board revises revenue sharing guidelines

On July 19, the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) approved revisions to the Revenue Sharing CTB Policy and Guidelines. A subcommittee appointed by CTB considered comments from various stakeholders, including VDOT District Staff and Local Governments.

Here are some of the highlights contained in the "Guidelines":

- The total funds available each fiscal year for revenue sharing will be determined by the CTB. The maximum annual allocation will be \$200 million, with the minimum allocation being \$15 million.
- A locality may apply for a maximum of \$5 million in matching allocations per fiscal year (\$10 million on a biennial cycle) and the maximum lifetime matching allocation per project is limited to \$10 million.
- Priority will be given to projects that meet a transportation need identified in the Statewide Transportation Plan (VTRANS) or to projects that can accelerate advertisement of a project in a locality's capital improvement plan
- Construction and maintenance projects will be evaluated and prioritized for funding as follows:
 - Priority 1 construction projects that have previously received Revenue Sharing Funding as part of Program application process.
 - Priority 2 construction projects that meet a transportation need identified in the Statewide Transportation Plan (VTRANS) or when funding will accelerate advertisement of a project in a locality's capital improvement plan.
 - Priority 3 projects that address deficient pavement resurfacing and bridge rehabilitation.
 - Priority 4 All other eligible projects.
- A locality must commit to its matching fund allocations at the time its application for funding is submitted. A resolution from the locality which includes its commitment to fully fund the project is also required.
- The local matching funds must be collected prior to the beginning of work.

The next application cycle for Revenue Sharing projects will begin August 1 and will be for a two-year cycle. Counties will receive an official invitation to apply for Revenue Sharing Program funding in the upcoming weeks. Regional FirstNet/AT&T State Plan Conferences

Work group holds first meeting on stormwater

On July 11 a newly formed 23 member Work Group authorized under HB 1774 (Hodges) met for the first time. The Work Group's purpose is to develop a series of recommendations that will be submitted to the 2018 General Assembly on how to make management of stormwater workable for all localities and the state. Within the past three years there have been at least two work groups convened for that very purpose.

Discussions at the July 11 meeting included a large number of diverse ideas that will continue to be discussed by the Group as it continues its work through the fall. Consistent with HB 1774's provisions, the Group meetings are being facilitated by the Virginia Coastal Policy Center at the William and Mary Law School.

Work Group members representing local government are Thomas Swarzwelder who is both Administrator and Attorney for King and Queen County, and David Nunnally, who directs Caroline County's Erosion and Sediment Control program. Other Work Group members with local government affiliations are Lewie Lawrence, Director of the Middle Peninsula Planning District; Eldon James with the Rappahannock River Basin Commission; and Chris Pomeroy, Counsel to the Virginia Association of Municipal Stormwater Agencies (VAMSA.) Other work group members represent environmental organizations, academia, the development industry and other diverse interests.

The Work Group will try to agree on its recommendations by October 31. The following is a schedule of full Work Group meetings. The locations have not yet been determined.

Financial Facts 8.47

GASB has issued a new standard, Statement No. 86, for state and local governments to apply when accounting for extinguishment of debt prior to its maturity. In this Statement, GASB establishes rules for accounting for the transactions in which cash and other monetary assets acquired with only existing resources are place in an irrevocable trust for the sole purpose to extinguish debt.

Current GASB standards already provide guidance for accounting and reporting when cash and other monetary assets acquired with the proceeds of refundable bonds are placed in a trust for future repayment of outstanding debt. Statement No. 86 addresses situations in which only existing resources (and no bond proceeds) are used to acquire cash and other monetary assets placed in a trust for the future repayment of outstanding debt.

The debt, cash and other monetary assets placed in trust are no longer reported on the financial statements when debt is defeased in substance but governments are required to disclose information in the financial statement notes about debt that has been defeased in substance. Statement No. 86 also provides guidance related to prepaid insurance on debt that is extinguished and notes to the financial statements about debt that has been defeased.

The standard takes effect for reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2017.

Virginia Counties Recognized for Model Programs

RICHMOND (August 1, 2017)—The Virginia Association of Counties (VACo) is pleased to announce the 17 recipients of the 2017 Achievement Awards recognizing model local government programs. VACo received 79 submissions.

Winning entries focused on addressing high priority issues that challenge counties today.

"This is the 15th year of the Achievement Awards Program, and we couldn't be more proud of the innovative work done by our member counties," VACo Executive Director **Dean Lynch said**. "I want to thank all who participated. It seems we are faced with more complex challenges every year, but Virginia's counties have found creative ways to overcome them."

Tedd Povar, Associate Director of the Virginia Institute of Government; **Dr. Sheryl Bailey**, Senior Vice President at Springsted Incorporated and former Chesterfield County Deputy County Administrator; and **Ted McCormack**, retired VACo Lobbyist, served as judges for this year's statewide competitive awards program.

York County and its Home-Based Business Assistance Program won this year's Best Achievement Award.

Ted McCormack explained why York County was the overall winner in 2017. "York County's Home-Based Business Assistance Program is innovative and focuses on an important but often overlooked aspect of a local economic development – meeting the needs of home-based businesses and helping them to grow."

For the first time in the Achievement Awards Program history, the judges selected a Best Small County Achievement Award (50,000 or less population) and a Best Large County Achievement Award. **King and Queen County** captured the Best Small County Achievement Award while **Chesterfield County** earned the Best Large County Achievement Award. "The Achievement Awards Program is a treasure trove of ideas for all localities in Virginia," Povar said. "I encourage all county administrators and staff as well as elected officials to review the 79 entries this year. The VACo Achievement Awards is not just a competition but also a sharing of ideas. Each batch of entries every year is a best practice repository available to everyone in the Commonwealth to learn from and perhaps replicate."

Dr. Bailey said she's encouraged by the creativity counties showed to find solutions. "This is the first time I've judged the VACo Achievement Awards, and I come away very impressed," Dr. Bailey said. "The future is certainly bright if this is an indication of the resourcefulness and ingenuity of county staff and leadership. I'm inspired by the good work done by Virginia's counties."

Chesterfield County tops the all-time Achievement Awards list with 26. Chesterfield County has won an award in each of the 15-year history of the program. **Henrico County** and **Loudoun County** are tied for second with 20 awards, respectively. **Prince William County** is fourth with 18.

The VACo Achievement Awards is a competitive program open to local government members of the association. VACo will present awards at Board of Supervisors meetings and recognize award-winning counties at the 2017 Annual Conference in November.

Proposed Changes to Smart Scale include limiting the number of applications



The Commonwealth Transportation Board is also considering changes that could take effect in "Round 3" of the "Smart Scale" Program during FY 2019. Following the first two rounds of the program, VDOT's staff has been evaluating ways in which the program may be improved. Some components of the program were discussed with VACo's Transportation Steering committee when it held a special meeting on June 15.

Smart Scale is lauded by supporters as a program that distributes transportation projects throughout the state on the basis of an objective scoring process. Due to limitations in transportation revenues, however, there was only about \$1 billion available for projects approved under "Round 2" of Smart Scale for a total of about \$9 billion worth of projects applied for by local governments in FY 2017.

VDOT staff is recommending the imposition of a limit on the number of projects for which a local government may apply in any given round. Specifically, a limit of 4 applications for localities with a population less than 500,000, and 8 applications for localities with a population more than 500,000. It is possible that CTB could adopt changes to the Smart Scale program at its October meeting. FEMA Proposal Affects All Communities Participating in the National Flood Insurance Program

FEMA has recently published notice of its intent to adopt a policy for managing minor development activities within the floodplain. See https://www.fema.gov/media-library/assets/documents/131010.

This policy proposal stems from a FEMA concern that many relatively minor low-impact activities which meet the definition of "development" within the NFIP regulations (CFR 44) are not being reviewed by participating localities and that while none individually are likely to increase risk within the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), the cumulative impacts over time could have that effect.

The draft FEMA Policy Guidance creates a new required process—Review, Assess & Document (RAD)—to manage and permit low-to-no-impact development activities within the SFHA. This process is to be applied to any development activity in the SFHA (defined as any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations or storage of equipment or materials), and especially for those activities which currently do not require a permit and often for which there is not an existing notification requirement within local building, planning or zoning codes.

(Front Royal) – County Administrator Douglas P. Stanley recently announced the start of transit service for the Route 340/522 Corridor starting July 31, 2017, which will extend from Front Royal to the Route 340/522 Corridor and Lord Fairfax Community College (LFCC) in Middletown.

Buses will run Monday through Saturday originating alternately from Royal Plaza or the Warren County Health and Human Services Complex to the Crooked Run and Riverton Commons shopping centers. There will also be limited commuter service to the Rappahannock-Shenandoah-Warren (RSW) Regional Jail and nearby large employers along Fairground Road, Baugh Drive and Toray Drive. The buses will make four runs daily to the LFCC campus Monday through Thursday.

Initiated by Warren County in collaboration with the Northern Shenandoah Valley Regional Commission in response to ridership trends and resident input, the new trolley line will provide Front Royal residents with transit access to additional medical care, education, shopping and employment. Riders will pay one \$1.00 for a one-way fare. Virginia Regional Transit will operate the service.

According to County Administrator Douglas P. Stanley, "We are extremely excited to get this service established. Since commercial development started taking off in the corridor in 2005, I have heard comments about the need for residents in the Town of Front Royal to be able to get out there to shop or get to work. The need was only exacerbated when the RSW Regional Jail opened in 2014. With over 2,600 industrial jobs in the corridor, in addition to the commercial employment, the bus service has the potential to positively impact the lives of many in this community.

"The service has been made possible through the generous support of our corporate partners including Axalta, Crooked Run Shopping Center, Front Royal-Warren County EDA, FDR Services, The Interchange Group, Lord Fairfax Community College, Nature's Touch, Northern Shenandoah Valley Regional Commission, Rappahannock Electric Cooperative, RSW Regional Jail, Sysco, Toray Plastics, and Valley Health. This is truly a Public-Private Partnership."

Karen Taylor, Senior Project and Operations Manager at the Northern Shenandoah Valley Regional Commission commented, "This new transit service represents a perfect example of what can be accomplished through true regional collaboration. Without participation from multiple private sector, nonprofit, and governmental partners, this opportunity to physically connect prospective employees to available jobs would have never come to fruition. We are proud that NSVRC was able to play a role in fostering that collaboration."

Jennifer McDonald, Executive Director of the Front Royal-Warren County EDA added, "The EDA was happy to participate in a much needed service for the residents and employees of Warren County. We hope this opens up employment opportunities for those that do not have access to affordable and consistent transportation to the employers in the corridor."

According to Russ Gilkison, Superintendent of the RSW Regional Jail, "I am hopeful the trolley service will provide those inmates participating in the work release program, and individuals being released from custody with a safe form of transportation. With the increased traffic speeds on Route 340/522 and during adverse weather conditions, it is not always an ideal option to walk. In addition, the trolley will be a benefit to those in the community who need public transportation access to the Magistrates Office and the jail."

Roanoke County Fire & Rescue Receives \$1 Million Grant

(Roanoke County, VA—August 1, 2017) Roanoke County is pleased to announce a grant award in the amount of \$1,084,206.00 from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) under the fiscal year 2016 Staffing for Adequate Fire and Response (SAFER) program. The SAFER program is a competitive grant awarded to deserving fire departments that demonstrate a clear need for additional firefighter staffing.

This cost sharing grant will, over a three year period, fund the hiring of 11 firefighter positions. DHS will fund 75% and Roanoke County will fund 25% in the first two years of the grant. In the third year of the grant, DHS will fund 35% and Roanoke County will fund 65%.

Roanoke County Fire & Rescue has for many years been challenged in meeting staffing levels while faced with increased needs for service. The department will utilize the 11 positions to ensure adequate emergency response capabilities. A recruit school scheduled to start in January 2018 will provide training and the new personnel will be assigned to stations beginning in May 2018.

The goal of the SAFER grant program is to assist local fire departments with staffing and deployment capabilities in order to respond to emergencies, and assure that communities have adequate protection from fire and fire-related hazards. Local fire departments accomplish this by improving staffing and deployment capabilities so they may more effectively and safely respond to emergencies.


