44 45	VACo calls upon the Governor and General Assembly to fully fund the Standards of

48 49	The provision of a quality education for all Virginia's children is the most important
50	function of state and local government. The infusion of K-12 funding provided in the

53 54	this critical mission. However, when adjusted for inflation, state direct aid per-pupil spending on public education in FY 2018 is less than funding levels in FY 2006. With
55	increased educational mandates, increased numbers of students, increased numbers of
56	students with special needs, and state policy changes that decreased education funding,
57	local school divisions have had to eliminate important academic programs, cut instructional and support staff, and increase class sizes, despite strong local efforts to
58 59	improve efficiencies in public education.
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ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND 82 PLANNING 83 84 Priorities 85 86 Broadband 87 VACo urges the Commonwealth and the Federal Government to assist 88 communities in their efforts to deploy universal affordable access to broadband 89 for all areas, particularly in underserved and rural areas. Additionally, VACo 90 91 opposes mandates that limit or restrict local land use authority for the siting of telecommunications infrastructure or result in a negative fiscal impact to county 92 93 budgets. 94 Proffers and Growth Management Tools 95 VACo supports changes to the conditional zoning law to allow greater flexibility 96 in the process for determining impacts to be addressed when considering an 97 application for development. 98 99 VACo also supports legislation that grants localities additional tools to adequately 100 meet increasing needs for public services driven by new development without 101 burdening current residents with the cost of new growth through increased real 102 estate taxes. Such additional tools may include broad impact fee authority for all 103 counties, and adequate public facilities provisions. 104 105 Positions 106 107 108 Land Use VACo supports maintaining local authority to plan and regulate land use and 109 opposes any legislation that weakens these key local responsibilities. 110 111 Enhanced Coordination between Workforce System and K14 112 Education 113 VACo supports changes in curriculum and funding that will increase the number 114 of students leaving the K14 system with workforce ready credentials. 115 116 VACo also supports innovative models for schools to give academic credit for 117 students who earn industry workforce skills through certifications, or licensure 118 from an approved education or training provider. 119 120 Regulation of Home-based Businesses 121 VACo opposes any legislation that limits or restricts local authority to regulate 122 home-based businesses, including short term rentals, regardless of whether 123 services or goods are purchased through an online hosting platform. 124 125 126

Major proposed changes to high school graduation standards will require additional resources to implement and those costs must be allocated fairly between the state and localities. VACo supports full restoration of these cuts, including elimination of the funding cap on support positions, and full reinstatement of the Cost of Competing Adjustment (COCA) for support staff. Adequate state funding for support staff and operations is critically important for the operation of any school system.

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- 251 Water Quality Improvement Funding
- VACo supports effective partnerships among and across all levels of governmentto improve water quality.
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VACo urges state and federal agencies to consider impacts on local governments 255 of any initiatives intended to reduce loadings of pollutants into state waters from 256 both point and non-point sources. In order for comprehensive, watershed-wide 257 water quality improvement strategies to be effective, major and reliable forms of 258 financial and technical assistance from federal and state governments will be 259 necessary. VACo supports the goal of improved water quality, but will oppose 260 261 provisions of any strategy that penalizes local governments by withdrawing current forms of financial assistance or imposing monitoring, management or 262 similar requirements on localities without providing sufficient resources to 263 accomplish those processes. VACo opposes the imposition of a state fee, tax or 264 surcharge on water, sewer, solid waste or any service provided by a local 265 government or authority. 266

267268 Hydraulic Fracturing

269 Advances in technology for the extraction of natural gas known as "hydraulic fracturing" has the potential to tap vast reserves in what are known as the 270 Marcellus shale and Taylorsville Basin deposits. Concerns about how the process 271 272 of hydraulic fracturing could impact both public and private groundwater supplies have been raised both regionally and nationally. VACo supports a state 273 regulatory program that addresses these concerns while protecting the authority 274 275 of local governments to regulate and/or ban this type of mining activity through their land use ordinances. 276 277

- Specifically, VACo supports a regulatory program with the following components:
 - A requirement for permit applicants to provide certification to the Department of Mines, Minerals and Energy that the activity and associated activities are consistent with applicable local ordinances;
 - Authority for local governments to require documentation that all state requirements are met as a condition for local approval;
 - Requirements for operators of hydraulic fracturing operations to demonstrate adequate financial assurance to ensure the availability of adequate resources to correct any damages that could result from drilling operations;

319 320	improper land application, VACo supports an effective statewide program and regulations governing land application of biosolids that protect the environment,
321	public health and safety. VACo also supports the ability of local governments to
322	monitor compliance with such regulations. To address concerns of neighboring
323	property owners, VACo supports the ability of local governments to suggest
324 325	amendments to biosolids permits as they are being considered by the Department of Environmental Quality.

327	Dam Safety
328	VACo supports dam safety regulations that do not impose unreasonable costs on
329 330	dam owners whose structures meet current safety standards. VACo encourages DCR to institute reasonable calculations of probable maximum precipitation
331	rainfall amounts that accurately identify at-risk structures and facilitate the most
332	efficient targeting of scarce resources to the neediest structures. VACo supports
333	programs that keep downstream owners and developers aware of potential
334 335	inundation zones. VACo also supports sufficient state and federal funding for the repair and maintenance of dams.

VACo endorses initiatives among all levels of government to reduce dependence
 upon foreign sources of energy, to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and to
 improve energy efficiency. VACo supports production of renewable energy in
 Virginia through the implementation of Renewable Portfolio Standards. VACo
 also supports responsible policies that enable coal and natural gas extraction,

processing and transport while protecting agriculture and water resources.

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- 345346 Invasive Species and Noxious Weeds
- VACo supports adequate funding to implement the Virginia Invasive Species 347 Management Plan. The Plan identifies strategies to prevent and control damage 348 caused by invasive species. VACo supports amendments to the definition of 349 "noxious weeds" to enable a wider number of known invasive plants to be 350 considered for regulation by the Virginia Department of Agriculture and 351 352 Consumer Services (VDACS), with consideration of any commercial impacts to Virginia growers and retailers, so that sales and transport of designated invasive 353 plants can be prohibited in a manner that helps protect parks and green spaces, 354 with negligible impacts to Virginia's nursery industry. 355

- 357 Land Conservation
- VACo supports targeted initiatives to facilitate the protection of land for
 conservation purposes. VACo also supports a Purchase of Development Rights
 program that includes state funding for the Virginia Land Conservation
 Foundation, and that provides incentives for landowners at all income levels to
 participate in the program. Such programs preserve prime soils for food
 production and protect important forestal land and environmentally sensitive
 areas in the Commonwealth.
- 365366 Large Utility Projects (Pipelines)
- VACo supports the provision of adequate direction and resources for the
 Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to improve monitoring and
 enforcement of Erosion and Sediment Control and Stormwater requirements by
 entities constructing large-scale utility projects. DEQ should conduct a review of
 the annual standards and specifications and construction general permit
 requirements for those projects to determine if they are providing adequate
 protection of water quality and natural resources.
- 374375 Non-Point Source Pollution
- VACo supports a well-financed state program to address the problem of nonpoint source runoff from agricultural operations. The program should effectively
 encourage implementation of priority best management practices such as
 nutrient management planning, use of cover crops, continuous no-till farming
 and development of forested riparian buffers and livestock stream exclusion.
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385 386 387 388 389	Southern Rivers Watershed VACo supports continued funding for the Southern Rivers Watershed Enhancement Program to improve water quality in non-Chesapeake Bay watersheds.

	Funding for State Mandated Positions and Jails VACo urges the Commonwealth to meet its full funding obligations and provide flexibility in the use of state funds for compensation of constitutional officers ar state-supported local employees.
	VACo requests that jail per diem funding in the 2018-2020 biennial state budge be returned at least to 2010 levels, which were \$8 per day for local-responsible inmates and \$14 per day for state-responsible inmates. The current respective rates of \$4 and \$12 per day, respectively, are inadequate and represent an underfunded mandate on counties.
	Additionally, VACo requests the state fully fund four quarters of per diem payments in the introduced budget and pay the medical costs of inmates using cost-effective program jointly funded at the federal and state levels.
	If the state mandates that mental health assessments be conducted for inmates local and regional jails who appear to be suffering from mental illness, based or an initial screening, within 72 hours of that screening, the state must provide funding to support the necessary staffing to conduct such assessments.
	VACo supports reinstating state payments (PILT) to counties that mitigate the impacts that state correctional and behavioral healthcare facilities on county revenue.
	"Local Aid to the Commonwealth" VACo commends the Governor and the General Assembly for eliminating the "Local Aid to the Commonwealth" in the 2015 session of the General Assembly and opposes any reinstatement of this burden on local governments. Since 200 local governments returned \$190 million in funding for state mandated service though through "Local Aid to the Commonwealth."

- Modernization of Communications and Sales Tax Structure 525 VACo supports updating the Communications Sales and Use Tax (CSUT) to 526 ensure that it reflects the modern telecommunications landscape, which has 527 528 evolved since the CSUT took effect in January 2007. Similarly, VACo supports revising sales and use taxes to address modern patterns of consumption, such as 529 online purchases. 530 531 Provisions of Bond Referenda 532 VACo supports the ability of counties to seek approval from voters of both the 533
- issuance of bonds and the authority to impose a food and beverage tax in a single
 referendum question. Such a referendum question would allow voters to approve
 the issuance of debt and the use of revenues derived from the food and beverage
 tax to repay the debt.

- 684 VACo supports transparent state policies and funding to ensure the
- 685 Commonwealth's at-risk families have access to high quality and appropriate
 686 services. The Commonwealth should provide full funding to localities and their
 687 state administrative entities for state-mandated human services and provide the
 688 necessary program flexibility to enable localities to provide comprehensive and
 689 case-tailored services.

- 693 Aging/Long-Term Care
- 694 VACo supports efforts that allow seniors to remain at home in a safe and secure
 695 environment. VACo urges the General Assembly to provide sufficient funding for
 696 companion services, in-home services and home delivered meals.
- 697 698 Behavioral Healthcare
- VACo supports continued funding by the Commonwealth sufficient to allow 699 700 Community Services Boards (CSBs) to meet adequately the charge of providing services through a community-based system of care. State support for CSBs must 701 be adequate to enable CSBs to provide the additional services mandated by the 702 General Assembly to be phased in over the next several years. Realignment of the 703 behavioral health funding structure to incentivize community-based treatment 704 705 rather than use of state hospitals will require additional state dollars and must not rely on local funding to backfill unanticipated costs for hospitalization. 706

 708 VACo supports the creation of additional Medicaid waiver slots to serve
 709 individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities in the community,
 710 more than 11,000 of whom are currently on a wait list.
- 711712 Children's Services Act
- VACo supports monitoring the implementation of policies by the State Executive 713 Council that provide guidelines for public participation in its process of 714 developing and adopting policy. VACo supports equitable cost-sharing between 715 the state and localities for the costs involved in the placements of children in 716 residential treatment facilities for non-educational reasons. VACo opposes 717 proposals to limit state participation in funding services for children and youth 718 719 who are mandated to be provided with special education and foster care services. VACo supports enhancing the ability of local school divisions to serve children 720 with disabilities in their neighborhood schools. 721
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725 726 727 728 729 730 731	Early Intervention VACo supports sustainable funding for Part C Early Intervention, which is an entitlement program that provides services for Virginia's infants and toddlers. VACo also requests that the General Assembly address funding concerns by increasing state general funding. Underfunding this entitlement program puts pressure on local revenues to fill funding gaps for this mandated service.
731 732 733 734 735 736	Emergency Medical Transportation VACo supports policies to protect consumers who require air ambulance services. Group Homes VACo encourages the state to enforce appropriate regulation of group homes to
737 738 739	ensure protection of residents' health and safety. Healthcare
740 741 742 743 744 745	VACo supports continued state funding for offered dental care, school nurses and preventive services and maternal and child health programs through local health departments and local school systems. VACo encourages the state to prepare for emergency health services access to care and to develop and fund incentives that would alleviate the nursing shortages felt in many communities.
746 747 748 749	Local EMS Involvement VACo supports increased local involvement in state EMS planning to ensure statewide needs are met.
750 751 752 753 754 755 756 757 758	Prevention Services VACo supports increased state general funding for startup costs associated with community-based service programs. VACo recognizes programs such as Healthy Families, Comprehensive Health Investment Project (CHIP) of Virginia, Smart Beginnings, and Resource Mothers as important models and requests that the General Assembly provide additional funding for these home-based activities. Reductions in prevention programs will put numerous youth at risk of high-end CSA placements.
759 760 761 762 763	Substance Abuse Efforts to address substance dependency must be comprehensive and coordinated with localities. The state should develop and support evidence-based prevention initiatives and should continue to improve access to treatment.
763 764 765 766 767 768 769 770 771	Telehealth VACo supports the use of electronic information and telecommunications technologies to support long-distance clinical health care, patient and professional health-related education, public health and health administration. Flexibility in the delivery of these services is essential in meeting the needs of residents.

TRANSPORTATION

773 774 <u>Priorities</u>

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Transportation Funding

VACo believes that the 2018 session of the General Assembly must confront the 777 funding challenges facing Virginia's transportation systems. Unless the 2018 778 779 legislature approves increased revenues for transportation needs that are 780 separate, reliable and permanent (including dedicated funding for Metro), Virginia will continue to face a congestion and mobility crisis that is strangling 781 economic growth, threatening public safety and negatively affecting the quality of 782 783 life of all residents. VACo appreciates the funding provided through HB 2313 (2013), which was a significant step towards addressing the transportation needs 784 of the Commonwealth. However, it did not fully address the needs of Virginia's 785 transportation system (annual revenue estimates are \$153 million less than 786 original projections) including: 787

- Providing more funding in the immediate future for roadways The 788 • amount of funding available for "Smart Scale" for the FY 2018-2023 Six 789 Year Improvement Program was approximately 1/8 of the amount 790 791 requested for proposed projects. Providing funding to address the secondary road needs of counties throughout the Commonwealth, as such 792 funding has been vastly reduced over the past 10 years. While the 793 Secondary Six Year Program (SSYP) effectively no longer exists, as those 794 road funding formulas have been replaced by the State of Good Repair and 795 Smart Scale process, projects previously funded under the SSYP do not 796 797 always compete well in these new programs, resulting in unmet needs that 798 continue to grow. 799
- Maintaining the existing funding levels for transit The Virginia
 Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) has identified an
 average revenue gap of \$130 million annually over the next ten years for
 transit capital needs across the Commonwealth due to the depletion of
 transportation bonds, which must be addressed.
- Finding a dedicated funding solution for Metro The State should provide sustainable funding today, and in the future, for Metro and give localities the authority to create dedicated funding sources for operating and capital expenses for WMATA contributions. The Commonwealth should also explore regional dedicated sources that follow the WMATA Compact funding formula.
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813	 Revenue Sharing - VACo supports a revenue sharing program that will be
814	funded at a minimum of \$150 million on an annual basis. Reducing
815	funding for Revenue Sharing will discourage local governments from
816	seeking non-VDOT sources of revenue to meet their transportation needs.
817	Local-State Cooperation
818	VACo also believes it is important to closely monitor and evaluate the
819	implementation of "Smart Scale" and all other processes employed in recent
820	years for distributing transportation funds.
821	
822	VACo is committed to the protection of local government authority to regulate
823	land use. This authority must be recognized by the Virginia Department of
824	Transportation (VDOT) and the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB)
825 826	when evaluations are conducted to determine the consistency between local
826 827	transportation plans and the Commonwealth's transportation priorities. VACo also opposes the reduction of local control that is associated with the CTB's
827 828	process of designating Corridors of Statewide Significance and the
829	implementation of Arterial Preservation. Additionally, VACo supports additional
830	flexibility within the VDOT project approval process and standards to be
831	responsive to localities' individual needs.
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833	Positions
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835	Devolution of Secondary Roads
836	VACo opposes legislative or administrative initiatives that would transfer to
837	counties the responsibility for the construction, maintenance or operation of new
838	and existing roads.
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840	Billboards
841	VACo supports a requirement that proposed billboards in the Virginia
842	Department of Transportation's (VDOT) right of way conform to local zoning and
843 844	other applicable ordinances and local approval processes.
845	Highway Tolls
845 846	VACo opposes the installation of toll facilities on Virginia's interstate highways
847	until the Commonwealth Transportation Board has thoroughly reviewed and
848	assessed the components of a long-term capital improvement program, has
849	identified and compared all available funding alternatives and has adopted a
850	proposal that matches capital improvements with realistically available funding
851	sources.
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853	Inter-Directional Signage Program
854	VACo supports a requirement that any signs installed under VDOT's Inter-
855	Directional Sign Program, including the Tourist Oriented Directional Signs
856	Program, conform to local ordinances, including any local approval processes.
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859 860 861 862	Maintenance Priorities VACo supports a requirement imposed upon VDOT to implement a notification plan with the local governing body to establish maintenance priorities.
863 864 865 866	Parking VACo supports general authority for counties to adopt ordinances regulating, including prohibiting, the parking of boats, RVs, utility trailers, campers, etc. on subdivision streets.
867 868 869 870 871	Rail Enhancement Fund VACo supports authority for counties to approve Rail Enhancement Fund projects funded by the state and constructed within their jurisdictions.
871 872 873 874 875	Railway Crossings VACo supports efforts to safely improve mobility issues on roads that cross railway lines.
876 877 878 879	Road Construction and Maintenance VACo supports legislation that would prohibit VDOT from requiring localities to administer any transportation project without the consent of the local governing body.
880 881 882 883 884 885 886 886	Transportation Network Companies VACo supports state regulation of transportation network companies as needed to ensure proper safety, liability, cleanliness, insurance coverage, local revenue, consideration of access for disabled riders, and equitable service in communities. VACo also supports the option of continued regulation of taxi companies at the local level.
887 888 889 890 891 892 893	Truck Size and Weight VACo strongly opposes any legislation that seeks to increase truck size or weight beyond the current federal standards, thereby stressing the capacity of the Commonwealth's road systems and putting highways, roads and bridges at risk of increased damage or deterioration.
895 894 895 896 897	Use of Transportation Tax Revenue VACo opposes taking any HB2313 transportation tax revenues for the use of non- transportation purposes.
