VACo Achievement Award Entry - Environmental Category 2012

Overview

- January 2012 Problem identified: Roadways, intersections and medians in Pittsylvania County were overcome with litter.
- <u>Challenges:</u> Educating the public about litter control; encourage cooperation among government,
 community and business leaders; attract businesses to the locality by showing pride in a clean
 community
- <u>February 6, 2012</u> The Pittsylvania County Board of Supervisors Establishes Beautification Committee comprised of seven citizens, one appointment from each Magisterial District
- March 20, 2012 Beautification Committee meets establishes goals, plans first annual county-wide clean-up effort in conjunction with "Earth Day"
- Committee partners with (1) Pittsylvania County's Grants Administrator/ State of Virginia Litter Control Grants, (2) Danville-Pittsylvania County Chamber of Commerce, (3) Pittsylvania County
 Commonwealth's Attorney's Office, (4) Pittsylvania County Sheriff's Department, (5) Pittsylvania
 County Bar Association, and (6) Pittsylvania County School Division, in the forming of "STOP Litter"
 (Students Taking on Pittsylvania County Litter) establishes monetary awards to high school clubs
 participating in clean-up efforts
- April 21, 2012 Successful First Annual County-Wide Clean-up held
- Local media covered clean-up efforts with tremendous photo coverage of participating individuals, civic
 organizations, school clubs and churches
- May 2012 High School Clubs presented with first "STOP Litter" monetary awards

Pittsylvania County Beautification Committee

Recognizing that the roadways, medians, and intersections of Pittsylvania County were overbearing with litter, newly elected Supervisor Brenda Bowman was concerned that the county she loved was unpleasing to the eye.

Having served on a Beautification Committee in another county, she immediately began to put into action a similar program to help spruce up Pittsylvania County.

At the February 6, 2012 board meeting, a Proclamation was adopted designating April 21, 2012, as Pittsylvania County's "Earth Day" and a citizen, Hershel Stone, came forth and volunteered to spear-head the first "Annual County-wide Clean-Up." He knew that the agenda included a proposal to form a Beautification Committee and he volunteered to work with the new committee, if approved, to organize the clean-up. Mr. Stone remarked:

"When people and business owners make decisions to come to a locality, they look at many variables. There is little that the average citizen can do to attract business to our community, but we can work to keep our road sides clean so that when businesses are looking at our community, they see a cleaner area, and a community that the citizens take pride in."

After Mr. Stone's presentation, Mrs. Bowman provided the below talking points:

Talking Points for establishment of

The Pittsylvania County Beautification Committee

 The Pittsylvania County Beautification Committee (PCBC) would be a group of citizen volunteers who are to be appointed by and report to the Board of Supervisors. One citizen appointment would be made from each of the seven districts in Pittsylvania County.

- The purpose of the Pittsylvania County Beautification Committee is to "promote a cleaner, more attractive Pittsylvania County and increase awareness of environmental issues among Pittsylvania County citizens." To accomplish these goals, the Beautification Committee will conduct and/or support several programs throughout each year.
- The PCBC will promote recycling, litter control, beautification, and educational programs aimed at creating a cleaner, more attractive and environmentally sound County community. Programs encouraging litter removal, placement of anti-litter signs, litter containers and litter waysides are also promoted. The Committee will conduct award and recognition programs for individuals, businesses, schools, and organizations, advancing the Committee's goals. Members will promote the preservation of the environment and beautification projects throughout the County.

The below items are just some suggestions for consideration by the committee as they organize and establish their own guidelines and goals:

- Organize an annual county-wide clean-up day in conjunction with Earth Week in April
 of each year, by working with local civic organizations, schools, churches, scout troops,
 etc.
- Clean Business Awards The PCBC recognizes those businesses who make significant
 efforts to improve the cleanliness and general appearance of their location, as well as
 those who consistently maintain a clean, highly attractive site. One business is selected

- quarterly from each of seven districts in the County. Business owners or managers receive a plaque at a Board of Supervisors meeting and a Clean Business Award sign is placed in a conspicuous place at their business for the quarter.
- Neighborhood of the Quarter or Yard of the Quarter Establish guidelines for possible competition - Signage award to be placed in yard or at entry to neighborhood
- 4. Tree Giveaways and Plantings Each year, in celebration of Earth Day and Arbor Day, the PCBC could give out tree seedlings. The committee could also provide flowers, such as daffodils, to be planted along Roads in the County. The Committee would purchase the bulbs, select the sites, and then work with VDOT to have them planted.
- 5. Litter Control Litter control prevention and education has been a primary objective of the Beautification Committee since its inception. To this end, the PCBC supports and promotes the state Adopt A Highway program. Sponsored by the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), Adopt A Highway involves utilizing groups and individuals who agree to clean a 2-mile stretch of road quarterly over a two year period and recycle the litter collected whenever possible. A sign is prominently displayed along the highway crediting the organization that keeps it clean and litter-free. In addition, the Committee also promotes the County's own Adopt A Spot program for those who wish to maintain sites in the county other than the roadside.
- 6. Beautiful Pittsylvania County Environmental Calendar -Each year, the PCBC holds a calendar art contest to illustrate the County's Beautiful Pittsylvania County calendar that is mailed to each home. In addition to providing environmental education relating to County programs, the calendar has become a great source of information for County events, program schedules, and meetings.

- 7. The Adopt a Spot Program was created by the State's Recycling and Litter Prevention office as a supplement to Virginia's Adopt a Highway Program. Groups and/or individuals are encouraged to play active and ongoing roles in beautifying, cleaning and maintaining Pittsylvania County's public spaces, including creeks and storm drains. Adopt a Spot activities might include removing litter, graffiti and/or weeds, maintaining a storm drain, and/or other forms of general upkeep. In certain locations, special landscaping features such as grass, plants, and flowers may even be added if they meet with Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and/or property owner specifications. Similar to the popular "Adopt-A-Highway" program sponsored by VDOT, organizations and individuals receive public recognition of their work through the prominent display of a sign "on the spot".
- 8. The possible designation of a Beautification Coordinator, a County staff member, who would assist the committee with grant applications and serve as its liaison to the County. There is already a Grants Writer on staff who receives funds for litter prevention.
 Funding for activities could come from the Virginia Department of Environmental
 Quality through the Litter Prevention and Recycling Grants Program, as well as other fundraising activities taken on by the Committee itself.
- 9. Citizens interested in serving on the PCBC should contact their supervisor.

After the above presentation, Mrs. Bowman made the following motion:

"I move that the Board of Supervisors establish a "Beautification Committee" consisting of one
(1) citizen appointed from each of the seven districts; said committee to consist of volunteers,
with no stipend or reimbursement requirements; and said committee will work with the county's

litter control office, with the Virginia Department of Transportation, the Virginia Litter

Prevention and Recycling Grants Program, with local civic organizations, and any other

entities, to raise funds and apply for grants to promote recycling, litter control, beautification

and educational programs aimed at creating a cleaner, more attractive and environmentally

sound County community."

The board unanimously voted to establish the Beautification Committee and present their appointments at the next board meeting.

At the February 21, 2012, Board of Supervisors Meeting, the following citizens were appointed to the first Pittsylvania County Beautification Committee:

Megan Evans, Tunstall District; Mollie Holmes, Banister District

Maurrica Doss, Callands-Gretna District; Bobby Jones, Jr. – Chatham-Blairs District

Vicky Collie – Dan River District; Mary Ellen Forrest – Staunton River District

Grady Carrigan – Westover District

The committee held its organizational meeting on March 20, 2012, and decided that the first and main focus would be the county-wide cleanup scheduled for April 21, 2012, less than 5 weeks away. Mr. Dan Sleeper, County Administrator, designated Mrs. Linda Mills, Pittsylvania County's grants administrator, to be a liaison between the county and the committee. Mrs. Mills who administers litter grants received from the State of Virginia, provided safety vests and bags for the clean-up, through this partnership, as well as assist with administrative duties for the committee.

With the challenge of organizing a huge event in less than five weeks, the committee networked with schools, scout troops, churches, and civic organization to promote the event and prepared flyers to be distributed throughout the county. The local newspapers, which had already covered stories about the newly formed Beautification Committee, included Public Service Announcements leading up to event. Banners were made and placed along Route 29 announcing the clean-up day.

An exciting collaboration was formed when the committee was contacted by David Grimes, Commonwealth Attorney for Pittsylvania County, and a representative of the Danville-Pittsylvania County Chamber of Commerce. Under the title of "STOP Litter" (Students Taking on Pittsylvania Litter), another partnership with the Beautification Committee began. The Chamber and local businesses offered to sponsor \$100 awards to a club in each of our four high schools who participated in the county-wide clean-up. The clean-up was approaching and was on the same weekend of high school proms, but one school participated on the clean-up weekend and another performed a clean-up at a later date. Laurie Moran, President of the Danville-Pittsylvania County Chamber of Commerce, along with the supervisors representing the school, presented the checks to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes of Tunstall High School and to the JROTC of Dan River High School.

The local newspapers covered the clean-ups with many photos and articles, and the Board of Supervisors thanked those who cleaned up in a Letter to the Editor of the two local papers. Over 30 groups and more than 300 citizens participated, along with their supervisors and members of the Beautification Committee. The committee is so excited about the success of their first effort, and they have decided to have the clean-ups twice a year, in the spring and fall. The committee is also now looking at other projects as they move forward.

Below are comments from members of the Beautification Committee summarizing why they became involved:

Megan Evans, the Chairwoman of the Beautification Committee: "My involvement with the Beautification Committee started when I inquired about recycling in Pittsylvania County, or the lack of. My New Year's Resolution for 2011 was to start recycling. We have a household of 4 to 6 people (including step-children who are with us on a scattered schedule). It was nothing for our home to fill two tall kitchen trash cans in two days. Gallons of milk, soft drinks, paper plates, cereal boxes, and cans filled up our bags in no time. When I thought of what a WASTE this was, I started a recycling center in our laundry room. We have gone from taking the trash out every other day to taking it out MAYBE once a week.

The sad part about the recycling center in my home is we have to drive over 20 miles to take our recycling off. This is because there are NO recycling drop- off locations in our County. After emailing the County about my concern, I was contacted by Mrs. Bowman to join her Beautification Committee. I accepted the invitation, and accepted the position as Chairwoman. We started our Committee off with a bang, and helped to plan a County-Wide Clean- up Day. This event was very successful, even with minimal time to plan and get the word out to the community. In our most recent meeting, we decided to have clean up days more often. We have also decided to start promoting the recycling our county does offer (newsprint and cans). Another idea the committee came up with is to start putting dirty "facts" in local newspapers about the impact not recycling has on our landfills and environment.

All in all, I feel our committee has a GREAT future. We are a very energetic group of citizens with a great leader in Mrs. Bowman, and we are eager to make a difference in our County!"

Committee member, Grady Carrigan states: "I got involved because I was disgusted with so much litter being thrown out on our roads. When people lose their pride in their home, their community and their county, you see things & places deteriorate to the point they are no longer pleasant to be around or to enjoy. The clean-up was a success. We will continue to improve the program by encouraging more churches, scouts, schools, businesses and individuals to become involved, and to keep the areas around and near their home clean with hope it sets the example for their neighbors and cleaning up will become contagious."

Although the establishment of our committee and programs are not new to other localities throughout the state, it is new to Pittsylvania County. We feel we have met the criteria for the VACo Achievement Award in the environmental Category. The Board of Supervisors recognized the problem of litter in the county and decided to do something about it by establishing a Beautification Committee made up of concerned citizens, who in turn worked in cooperation with the county administrator's office, the grants administrator's office, the Chamber of Commerce, the local newspapers, and businesses throughout the community. Although in our infancy, we hope to be a model for other local governments and that we have provided tools for their success as well.

Comments made during "Hearing of Citizens" by Hershel Stone, February 6, 2012

I am here tonight to ask you to support a county wide clean-up on April 21st to coincide with Earth Day. Eighteen months ago, we moved to Pleasant Gap Dr. Alan Easley, who heads up an annual clean-up for our area, invited our family to help with the clean-up. We did and what a difference it made to the road sides. Most important, it made a great impression on my 2 children who helped with the clean-up. It has almost been a year since the last clean up and Pleasant Gap is littered again and we are looking forward to the clean-up in a few months. BACKGROUND:

The Honorable Brenda Bowman, Supervisors from the Chatham-Blairs District, has requested the Bos Supervisors to establish a Beautification Committee in Pittsylvania County consisting of one (1) citizen apperfrom each district.

DISCUSSION:

The Board of Supervisors must determine to develop this committee and make the necessary appointmen general guidelines concerning the committee, and whether they will be all volunteer or any reimbursarequirements established for this committee. They will have some large shoes to fill. Since 1983, Pittsyl County has placed 1st in local government in the Keep Virginia Beautiful Program ten (10) times! Pittsyl County Beautification and Litter Control came in 2nd place in the Nation in the Keep America Beautiful Protwice- in 1999 and in 2004 in the category of local government. County programs were volunteers working Linda Mills, Grants Administrator and the part-time County Litter Control Coordinator. People like Fithollam Hurt and Blanch Crews pulled many local garden clubs and private beautification groups toget establish this legacy.

February 6, 2012

- I'd first like to thank those who have worked in the past, and those who continue to work with clean-up efforts in Pittsylvania County, especially Linda Mills, Francis Hurt, Blanch Crews, and Virginia Andrews, who was a part-time County Litter Control Coordinator. Mrs. Andrews is now deceased. Through their efforts working with local garden clubs and the state "Keep Virginia Beautiful Program," Pittsylvania County has won numerous recognitions and placed 2nd in the Nation in the "Keep American Beautiful Program," once in 1999 and again in 2004. The establishment of a Beautification Committee will revive and enhance these previous efforts.
- As we move forward in an effort to bring businesses and families to settle in our area, it
 is important that we continue to seek ways in which we can show pride in our county, and
 enhance the appearance of our roads, businesses and homes.
- I realize that this effort may be a sensitive matter to some; after all, one's personal

"When I was campaigning, seven members - a resident that came up a lot," said Bowman, who was elected to the

Bowman said she hopes the from their district to serve on committee would be formed before the end of the month. Its members would establish a mission, purpose and guidelines for the committee, which would coordinate with the county's grants administrator, who also serves as litter coordinator.

Bowman would like to see

a beautification program to include an annual Earth Day clean-up and monthly or quarterly recognition for residents and businesses for tidy, litterfree property. The county could also work with groups and volunteers to spruce up neighborhoods.

"Driving around, I see a lot of areas that need to be cleaned up," Bowman said.

The county spends no money on litter control or beautification but receives a state litter control/beautification that funds the part-time grants administrator position, said Pittsylvania County Administrator Dan Sleeper. The money has been cut every year since 2007,

Sleeper said.

Board of Supervisors Chairman Tim Barber said he supports the concept of forming the committee and getting residents involved in cleaning up the county to make it more attractive.

"I think the committee would be a good idea," Barber said. However, the board will not have room in its budget to spend money for it, he said.

Staunton River Supervisor Marshall Ecker, who pushed the county to hire a part-time litter coordinator and bring the county's litter fines up to state levels, said he is glad the board has someone who supports cleaning up Pittsylvania County.

Dry Fork resident Hershel Stone said he aims to encourage citizens to set aside Saturday, April 21, as a day to clean up their properties in recognition of Earth Day, which is on April 22. Bowman and Stone hope the beautification committee would continue the tradition in subsequent years.

Stone said beautification is more than just cleaning up property and picking up trash along roads. It impacts economic development because businesses do not want to locate to an area that has litter, he said. All of Pittsylvania County can get behind improving its appearance.

"This is an issue the northern and southern parts of the county can relate to and both of them can support it," Stone said.

An annual clean-up day held by Pleasant Gap Drive residents inspired Stone to try to establish a similar countywide occasion.

"Why can't the county do this as a whole?" Stone said.

Stone said he will present his proposal for the clean-up in honor of Earth Day during the board's regular meeting to be held at 7 p.m. Monday in Chatham.

(<u>S</u>tudents <u>Taking On Pittsylvania <u>Litter</u>)</u>

A partnership of VDOT, Pittsylvania County School Students and Administration, Danville-Pittsylvania Chamber of Commerce, the Pittsylvania County Sheriff's Office, and the Pittsylvania County Bar Association

Student organizations need financial support for many worthwhile projects. Pittsylvania County has thousands of miles of roads and, unfortunately, many of those miles are ugly with trash.

Many business leaders and working adults have little time to devote to cleaning and beautifying our County, but may be willing to invest in that effort. This is one modest proposal to address all of the above: a cooperative effort initiated by the Pittsylvania County Bar Association, supported by Pittsylvania County Sheriff Mike Taylor, the Virginia Department of Transportation, the Danville-Pittsylvania Chamber of Commerce and, most important, the students and administrators of Pittsylvania County's four high schools.

Each of our four high school principals is invited to designate a list of qualified student organizations and to inform the leaders of those groups of this program.

Any such organization may then do the following:

- Locate the most "needy" section of public highway in their school attendance district.
- 2. Submit a "bid" describing the exact location and length of highway the organization is willing to rid of litter; when they can do it; how much money they require to have donated for their efforts. VDOT requires one adult to accompany every six participants under the age of 18. This is not "Adopt a Highway": each bid will be for a one-time clean-up of a given location.

The Pittsylvania STOP Litter Committee* will review all applications, giving priority to the worst and/or most visible sections of road, while seeking to fairly distribute available funding to the participating schools.

The Committee will try to link each bid with a business or person willing to sponsor that bid.

Once a bid is approved and sponsored, the clean-up will be scheduled. The Committee will obtain VDOT litter bags and vests and, hopefully, temporary signs to let the public know who is cleaning their needy highway and who is paying to have it cleaned. When the clean-up is complete, the sponsor will deliver the agreed donation. The student organization will be responsible for securing adult participants or supervisors and for timely removal of signs. Sheriff Mike Taylor will coordinate removal of litter bags.

Local news media will be fully informed and encouraged to recognize the students for their efforts and sponsors for their support.

This is a work in progress. Suggestions for improvement and invited.





Our View

When every single day is Earth Day

The logic behind recycling is simple: Why throw out something that can be used again and again?

But getting from that sound principle to a workable recycling program is

another story.

In Pittsylvania County, about a third of the trash is recycled, which extends the life of the county's landfill. But the board of supervisors' beautification committee wants to expand recycling in Pittsylvania County.

"It's a huge, huge need," said Megan Evans, chair of the beautification committee. "To be such a large county, there's a huge need for recycling."

The county's 19 trash collection sites include bins for newsprint, aluminum cans and cardboard. Mixed metals are separated at the Dry Fork landfill and sold to support landfill operations. But costs — and the market — keep the county from collecting plastic and glass.

"We're pretty close to doubling what the state requires," said Assistant County Administrator Otis Hawker. "... We should all try to recycle, reuse and do the best that we can, but with the economy the way it is nationwide, you're not seeing markets develop."

Even though plastics and glass recycling isn't offered at the county sites, Pittsylvania residents can still bring their recyclables to bins in Danville.

The payoff? People won't throw away something that can be used again. The city will be able to ship more recyclables, and the county's landfill won't fill up as fast.

Gone are the days when people could — or should — dump their trash in a ditch. Pittsylvania County's beautification committee is trying a lot of things at once to maintain the community's rural charm. Last month's Earth Day cleanup was just the start.

There is a growing realization that the county's scenic vistas and rural roads are worth the effort it takes to clean them up — and maintain them.

At the same time, Virginia's largest county could never afford to be able to do the work that volunteers on Earth Day were able to do. There simply isn't room in the county budget for beautification. There probably never will be.

But the beautification committee is onto something. A few grants here, and a day of cleaning there and the county will be better off for it. Beautification is not the biggest issue facing Pittsylvania County, but it matters for most people—and their property values.

Evans said she would also like to see the committee encourage residents to clear trash, old cars and overgrown grass from their yards. An unkempt lawn can reduce neighbors' property values, Evans said. Also, a cleaner county helps attract businesses, she said.

The beautification committee's first meeting since Earth Day takes place Tuesday in Chatham. While there will be reflection on the countywide clean-up on April 21, the meeting will also be a "stepping stone" for the group to see how they will tackle the issue of recycling in the county, Evans said.

More than 300 people among 28 groups took part in Earth Day activities in the county.

There were 87 bags of trash collected on Pleasant Gap Drive alone in Dry Fork, said Chatham-Blairs Supervisor Brenda Bowman, who proposed development of the com-

"All seven districts [in the county] had groups that participated," Bowman said.

The event's results were over-

whelming, said Bowman, who was pleased with how the endeavor turned out. The committee, which coordinated the county's first Earth Day clean-up with Hershel Stone, will make it an annual activity.

"I know it will grow," she said.

Other projects the committee will consider is encouraging businesses to spruce up their properties or adopt a road, intersection or median for clean-up and maintenance, Bowman said.

Businesses may be recognized with a plaque for business of the month or quarter.

Residential competitions for yard of the month or quarter would be held, or a contest, Bowman said.

Bowman also expects next year's Earth Day to be even better, since the committee will have more time to promote the event.

doing this next time," she said.

Evans and Bowman hope the committee takes advantage of grants available for clean-up projects, for campaigns to help stop litter and encourage recycling.

"We want to show pride in our community," Bowman said.

As for recycling, Board of Supervisors Chairman Tim Barber said he would like for the county to perform

Otis Hawker, assistant county administrator, said the county offers aluminum and newspaper recycling at its compactor sites. Also, metal from household appliances is separated from other waste at the county landfill in Dry Fork and is sold on the market. The practice generates money used to maintain the landfill, Hawker said.

The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality requires at least 15 percent of principle recyclable material - plastic, paper, metal, computers/electronics - among waste from the county and its businesses and schools to be recycled, Hawker said. The county recycles about 30 percent, he said.

Hawker is scheduled to speak on . "I'd love to see 1,000 people out recycling at the committee's meeting at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Captain Martin Building at 1 Center St. in Chatham.
