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History at Your Fingertips

Overview and Program Summary

There are 120 clerks of circuit court in Virginia and these clerks are responsible for maintaining all of the court's records, including the valuable historic court records. While there are 120 clerks of the circuit court, only five (5) of these offices possess the entire collection of historic court records. During the Civil War, the majority of clerk's office experienced loss of some records collections as records were burned, destroyed, stolen, lost or otherwise removed from the local courthouse.

Recognizing the valuable collection of historic records that Loudoun County possessed, the clerk's office commenced aggressive steps to inventory all historic court records to ensure appropriate conservation and preservation efforts were implemented. Once the records were successfully preserved, the clerk's office initiated a very aggressive campaign to scan and digitize the historic records. One purpose in scanning these records was to encourage citizens who research historic records to use the digital version of the record to reduce the handling of some fragile court papers. The other purpose in digitizing these records was to load the digital records on government websites so citizens could have easy and convenient access to the valuable court records. By properly preserving old and fragile historic court records, digitizing these records to provide access via computer workstations and by providing remote online access through government websites, the Clerk of the Circuit Court is essentially providing historic court records at the fingertips of Loudoun County citizens and numerous historians around the country.

Putting Loudoun's History at the Fingertips of Loudoun's Citizens

Problem or Issue

The historic records in the office of the clerk of the circuit court are valuable records that provide information regarding Loudoun's history from 1757 to the present. The clerk's office experienced problems with having adequate office space to properly and effectively display these valuable records for public review and research. Many of the older records were very fragile and while the clerk's office wanted to provide access to these older records, the office was also concerned about the frequent handling of these original records resulting in irreparable damage to the fragile papers. The other problem that the clerk's office clients experienced was not having easier access to historic records requiring clients to travel long distances to conduct historic records research. Many clients who are involved with research of historic records in paper format were required to travel from other states all across the United States to research Loudoun's court records.

The clerk's office needed to develop a game plan to identify historic records that needed to be available to the public for research and inspection while simultaneously ensuring adequate protections of the original papers and books. Additionally, the clerk's office needed to find a more effective means of providing public access as the lack of office space compromised the public's ability to view these valuable records. To address the needs of the genealogical researchers and other clients who travel from other states, the clerk's office needed to develop an online service to better serve these clients.

Description of Program

There are 120 circuit court clerk's office in the Commonwealth of Virginia and each clerk of the circuit court in Virginia has historic court records that date back the origin of each respective county or city. While all 120 circuit court clerks have a collection of historic records, only five (5) clerks of circuit court possess all of the county or city historic court records. The reason that only five (5) offices have all of the county or city court records is because during the Civil War, many court records were stolen, burned, destroyed, lost or removed for safe keeping during the war but were never returned to their rightful home at the local courthouse. Loudoun County is fortunate to be one of those five counties or cities that possess all of the county's historic court records.

To ensure that these valuable historic records were properly preserved and available for public inspection, the clerk of the circuit court decided to dedicate more resources to the restoration of these valuable records. Additionally, the clerk desired to remove some of the older records that were in storage for decades and make these records accessible to citizens. The clerk faced many challenges as the condition of many records would not permit the display of those records for public inspection. The other complication to putting the records out for display and public inspection was there was inadequate and insufficient office space. To address the problems, concerns and needs related to the display of historic court records, the clerk of the circuit court developed a step by step plan in March 2010 that included the following steps:

Putting Loudoun's History at the Fingertips of Loudoun's Citizens

- 1) Conduct a thorough review and inventory of all records from 1757 to the early 1900's
- 2) Identify those records that provided the most value to historic records researchers, genealogist, and historians.
- 3) Identify those records that would contribute to historic anniversary programs and other history programs in Loudoun County.
- 4) Initiate a scanning project to digitize those records identified as having a top priority for improved public access.
- 5) Provide improved public access to history and historic records by using online and web-based programs and services.

Using this step by step approach, the clerk's office established a priority of the following types of books and records that should be digitized to reduce the use of the fragile or damaged books and papers:

- Will Books (1757-1841)
- Will Packets 1757-1820s

- Free Black Papers – 1830 - 1863

- Death Register 1854-1866
- Militia Books 1793-1809
- Birth Registers 1854-1866
- Marriage Registers 1852-1914
- Marriage Returns 1767-1850
- Rough Order Book 1780-1783
- Muster Roll of Loudoun Confederate States of America Soldiers
- Manassas Gap Railroad Plates
- Chancery Records 1757-1914

From April 2010 to August 2012, the clerk's office used a large number of volunteers to help with the inventory process. These volunteers included genealogists and historians who understood the value of these records. The volunteers received extensive training on the handling of these valuable but fragile records. From September 2010 through April 2014, the clerk's office used state grant funding to initiate aggressive restoration efforts to ensure the valuable records were better protected and preserved. The preservation work was conducted by some volunteers, by clerk's office employees and by archival records preservation contractors. The archival records preservation contractors were paid with state grants administered by the Library of Virginia.

Once the preservation processes were completed, the clerk's office initiated the scanning and digitizing processes. Since the condition of the books, papers and records differed and the sizes of some records varied, the clerk's office purchased several different types of scanning equipment to accommodate the digitizing processes. Funding for this scanning equipment and the scanning software was provided by a variety of state and technology grants available for clerks of circuit court in Virginia. With limited staffing available to perform the scanning operations, the clerk's office acquired state grant funding to hire a full-time temporary employee dedicated to the scanning and conversion process. After training on the scanning operations, this grant-funded employee commenced work on the scanning projects in September 2013. The scanning and digitizing of the records continues and will continue until all the records have been digitized and are available for public research and inspection in digital format.

Financing and Staffing

No local tax dollars or local budgets were used to finance the inventory and document conversion costs associated with this program. As stated previously, volunteers were used to assist with the inventory process so there was no cost for the inventory process. With the historic records experience these volunteers had, the clerk's office was able to complete the inventory work at no additional costs to the local government.

The processes related to preservation were financed by state grants administered by the Library of Virginia and by some local budget funds. The total amount of Library of Virginia grant funds used to preserve papers and books from September 2010 through April 2014 is \$105,857. Local budget costs for preservation work included \$5,405.04 for supplies such as acid free boxes used to store paper records and clear plastic sleeves used to help keep fragile papers intact and prevent tearing.

The costs associated with personnel who perform the scanning and digitizing of the historic court records have been financed exclusively with state technology grants in the amount of \$55,000. No local tax dollars or local budgets have been used for the scanning and document conversion projects. Technology grant funding of \$66,950 has been spent for the three (3) different types of scanners used for document conversion, for conversion software and for annual maintenance contracts for the scanner equipment.

Results of the Program

This program has achieved the intended results as the clerk's office has improved access to significant and important historic records. Access has been improved for citizens and clients who visit the local courthouse as the digital historic court records allow easier and more convenient access to these records. Less office space is required to permit inspection of the historic records that are in digital format as the computer monitors used to view the records take up less space than the original books and papers. The original papers are better protected as a result of the preservation and digital conversion as the clerk's office has reduced the use of the fragile original paper records to conduct research.

Since the digitized historic records are posted on the office website or on the Library of Virginia website, many patrons who reside in other states can view the historic records online through the websites. These out of state patrons can download and print copies of the online historic records. Some of the older deed records that have been converted to digital images have been loaded into the clerk's online deed system. The clerk's office has an online subscription service that permits subscribers to access the deed records remotely. Subscribers to this service who wish to research older deed records dating back to the late- 1800's early can view these records from other states where they reside and do not have to travel to Virginia do conduct their research.

By virtue of preserving these records and providing them in digital format, the clerk's office has been able to conduct numerous history programs to educate Loudoun's citizens on the

valuable history we have in Loudoun County. The clerk's office has hosted a variety of history events related to the American Revolutionary War, the Civil War, Black History Month and many other programs. The clerk's office has developed effective partnerships with other history groups and historical foundations such as the Oatlands Foundation, Balch Library, the Library of Virginia and others to host joint events to promote Loudoun's history and our historic artifacts. These joint programs include the celebration of Black History Month and programs involving the presentation of information related to the confederate soldiers from Loudoun County, the American Revolutionary War soldiers and the life and times of typical Loudoun residents from 1757 through the 1880's.

These programs have provided significant information regarding Loudoun County's rich history and heritage. More citizens are aware of the valuable historic court records dating back to the origin of Loudoun County in 1757 because this program has empowered citizens, genealogists, and historians to have fingertip access to valuable historic record treasures.

Benefits of Program

Considering the value of the historic records contained within the local courthouse in Loudoun County, Virginia, this program has provided considerable benefits to citizens, students, historians and genealogists. Loudoun County, Virginia is one of only five counties or cities in the entire Commonwealth of Virginia to have all of its court records. Given the fact that the majority of counties or cities had court records stolen, lost, destroyed, burned or misplaced during the Civil War, Loudoun's historic records are a treasure.

The clerk of the circuit court has fulfilled a promise to provide improved access to and awareness of these historic records treasures. The clerk of the circuit court has demonstrated fiscal responsibility in the manner in which this program was executed. The citizens of Loudoun County have received a tremendous return in the investment of resources involved with the inventory processes, the preservation work, and the document conversion processes. The program has achieved outstanding results by virtue of putting Loudoun's history at the fingertips of Loudoun's citizens.

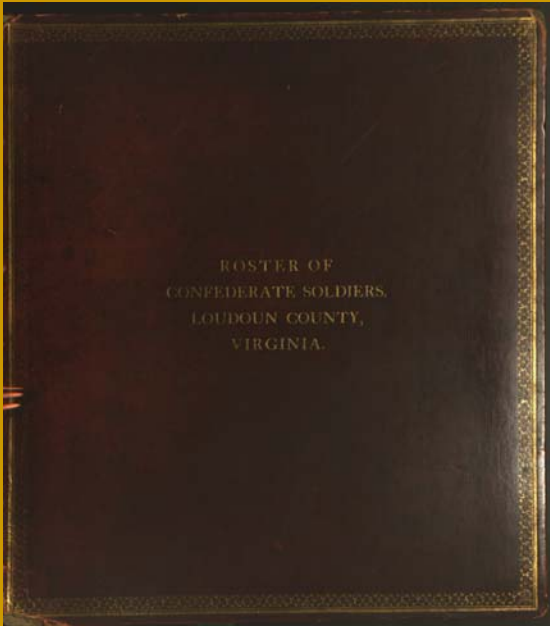

Business Hours

The Clerk's office is normally open to the public from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Land Records Division, Probate Department and the Public Services registers close transactions each day at 4:00 p.m.

Overview

The Clerk of the Circuit Court is the custodian of the court records, land records, marriage licenses, judgments, estate records and other legal documents. Most of the records are available for public inspection in the Clerk's Office.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court issues marriage licenses, accepts applications for trade names and processes applications to become a notary public. The Clerk of the Circuit Court accepts deeds and other legal land documents for recordation. We also accept the filing of lawsuits consistent with the Code of Virginia.

The Clerk of the Circuit Court (Probate Department) has the authority to probate wills, appoint and qualify executors and/or administrators for a decedent's estate and the authority to qualify conservators and guardians. To obtain information on Decedent's Estates, Testamentary Trustees, Conservators, Guardians for Incapacitated Adults and Guardians for Minors, please click on the link to Probate above.

Welcome to the Archives section of the Loudoun County Circuit Clerk's Office!

The Archives section maintains all the historic records for the Clerk's Office. On this page, you'll find a list of some of the records we have. Since there are numerous miscellaneous books maintained in the Archives, this is only a partial listing.

Copy Information

The costs are:

- 50 cents per page for 8½ x 11 and 8½ x 14
- \$1.00 per page for 11 x 17, available 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Note: Copies can be made from most books and documents, however, the Clerk's Office reserves the right to refuse to make copies from items deemed oversized or fragile.

Overview

Loudoun County is one of only a few counties in the Commonwealth that has records dating from the beginning of the county, which was formed in 1757 from Fairfax

County.

The records were originally kept in a vault at Rokby, the home of the first Clerk of Court Charles Binns, located near Leesburg. In 1800 an office for the Clerk was ordered to be built on the Courthouse lot in order to have the records closer to the court. The records were brought to Leesburg and Mr. Binns resigned after being Clerk for 43 years. During the Civil War, George K. Fox who was the Clerk of Court was ordered to take the records somewhere for safe keeping and the legend is he took them to Campbell County, Virginia, and hid them. After the war all the records were returned safely to Leesburg and have been housed in various locations adjacent to the Courthouse ever since.

The Archives section is currently located in a newly renovated area adjacent to the File Room in the basement of the new Courts Complex. To access the Archives, enter the building through the main entrance for the Courts Complex located on Market Street and follow the directions.

Records in the Archives Section

Wills

- **Index for Wills: 1757-June 1995**-All will/probate/estate records from 1757 to June 30, 1995 are located in the archives. All wills after June 1995 are available on the public access computers located in the Clerks Office on the second floor of the court house.
- **Will Books 1757-1984** are located in the archives. Will books from 1984-1995 are on microfilm only in the archives.

Deeds

- **Index for Deeds 1757 to 1893:** Located in the archives. All indexes for deeds after 1893- to the present are located in the Clerk's Office on the second floor.
- **Deed Books from 1757- Book 809 (1982)** are located in the archives.
- **Deed Books 1982-Present:** To view a deed book after March 1982 (Book 809), you must go to the main Clerk's Office located on the second floor. Deed Books 8A (1905) to the present are available on the public access computers located in the Clerk's Office on the second floor.

Tithables

These are early tax records. The 1758 to 1786 originals are not indexed. They list name of person responsible for paying the tax, all males over the age of 16, some women and slaves. Most free females were not taxed in those days.

Marriages

- **Index for Marriage Records:** Includes records from 1793 to June 1995. Index for marriages after 1995 are on computer only and are available at the desk in the archives section.
- **Marriage Records:** Includes bonds 1767 to 1850; ministers' returns, which list only the names of the parties married and the date, 1793 to mid-1800s; and licenses from the mid-1800s to the present which have the marriage date and additional information.

Birth and Death Records

- **Births:** 1853 to 1859, 1864 to 1866 and 1869 to 1879
- **Deaths:** 1853 to 1866

Note: These birth and death records are incomplete and are available only in book form. Due to the large size and fragile condition **no copies will be made from the books**. An abstract of the record can be made and certified if desired.

- **The Index of Birth and Death Records 1912 - 1917** is [online](#).

Order Books and Suit Papers

- **Court Order Books:** Includes records from 1757 to January 1984. Early order books contain general court business and include references to orphans, children bound to learn a trade, manumissions, road and mill petitions and administrations on an estate if there was no will.
- **Index of Chancery Causes:** Index to early court suits are known as the "M" files. The "M" files contain the papers from early court suits.
- **Index to Road Cases:** These are petitions for opening roads in pre-state highway system days.

Land Books (Assessments)

- **Land Books:** Includes books from 1851 to 1991. The early years are incomplete with some years missing. Due to the large size and fragile condition **no copies will be made from the books**.

Record of Free Negroes

- **Record of Free Negroes:** This register of free blacks, 1844-1861, is indexed by name and contains information regarding the individual registering. See [Court Order Books](#) above.

From the Vault

You Never Know What You'll Find

Recently while unfolding the old marriage licenses for the year 1904 so they could be inventoried, organized and flat filed, a license from the year 1864 was found tucked away for safe keeping in the bundle.

The license, issued November 15, 1864 by George K. Fox, Jr., Clerk of Court for Loudoun County, was for the marriage of Edmond C. Fitzhugh and Ann F. Grayson.

The husband was 43 years old, born in Stafford County and a widower. He was the son of Dr. Alex and Eliza Fitzhugh. His place of residence was listed as "in camp" and his occupation as soldier. The wife was 34 years old, born in Stafford County and single. She was the daughter of Richard O. and Maria Grayson. Her place of residence was listed as Newstead, Loudoun County.

The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. W. W. Williams and took place at Newstead on December 29, 1864. The Clerk noted at the bottom of the license "The minister can keep this, and return it to me when this cruel war is over."

We don't know how it got there but forty years later, on October 25, 1904, Rev. A .C. Thomson, Rector of Trinity Church, Portsmouth, Virginia returned the license to Loudoun County. The license was placed with the 1904 returns instead of being filed with the year in which it was issued and had been there for the last 100 years. Although the license was indexed in Marriage Register No. 1, the original license was presumed lost. It has now been "found," properly filed and is available for research purposes.

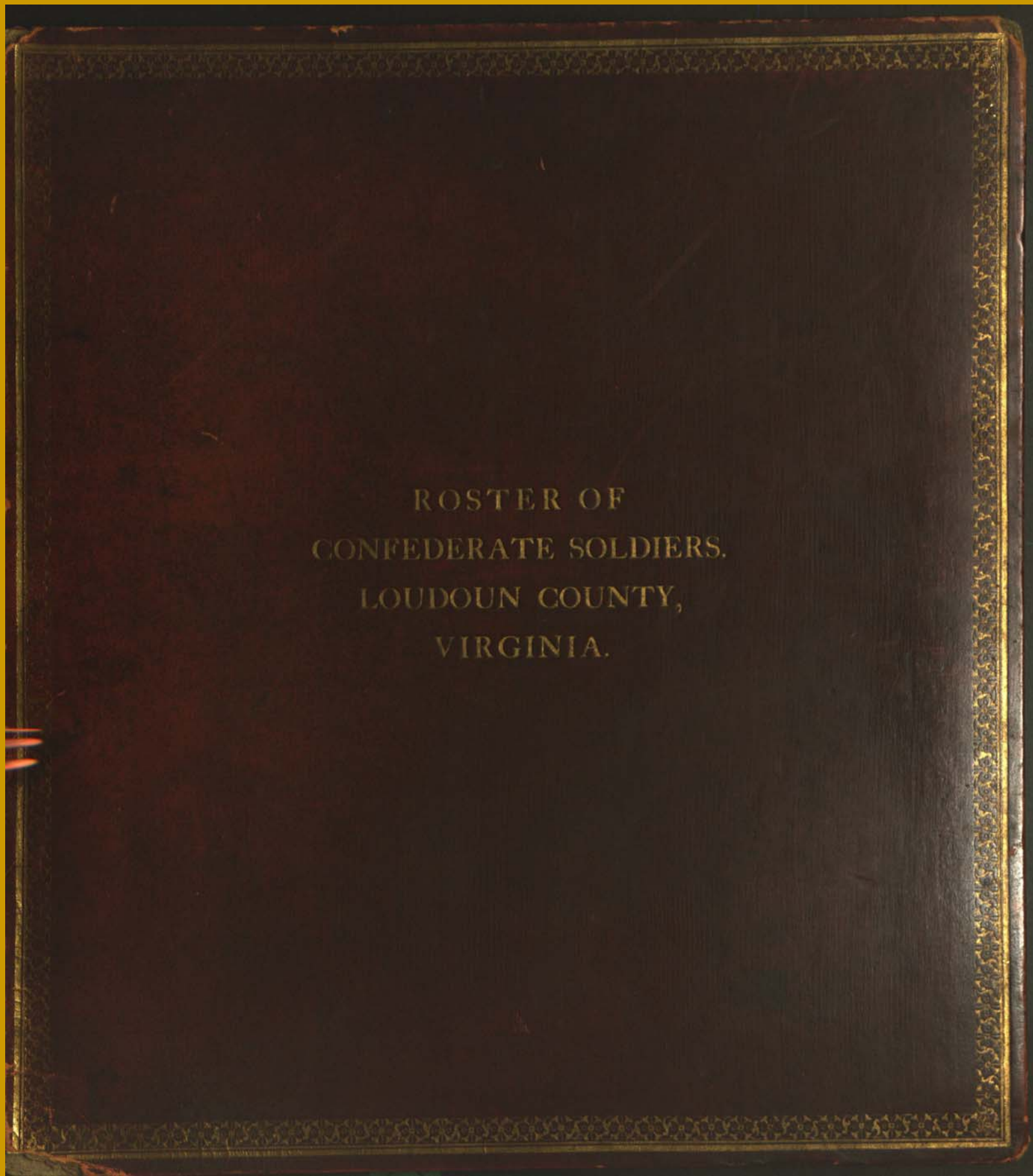

No. 9.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY NORTHERN VIRGINIA.

APPOMATTOX C. H., April 10, 1865.

After four years of arduous service, marked by unsurpassed courage and fortitude, the ARMY OF NORTHERN VIRGINIA has been compelled to yield to overwhelming numbers and resources.

I need not tell the survivors of so many hard-fought battles, who have remained steadfast to the last, that I have consented to this result from no distrust of them ; but feeling that valor and devotion could accomplish nothing that would compensate for the loss that must have attended a continuance of the contest, I determined to avoid the useless sacrifice of those whose past services have endeared them to their countrymen.

By the terms of the Agreement, Officers and men can return to their homes and remain until exchanged. You will take with you the satisfaction that proceeds from the consciousness of duty faithfully performed, and I earnestly pray that a merciful God will extend to you His blessing and protection. With an unceasing admiration of your constancy and devotion to your Country and a grateful remembrance of your kind and generous consideration of myself, I bid you all an Affectionate Farewell.

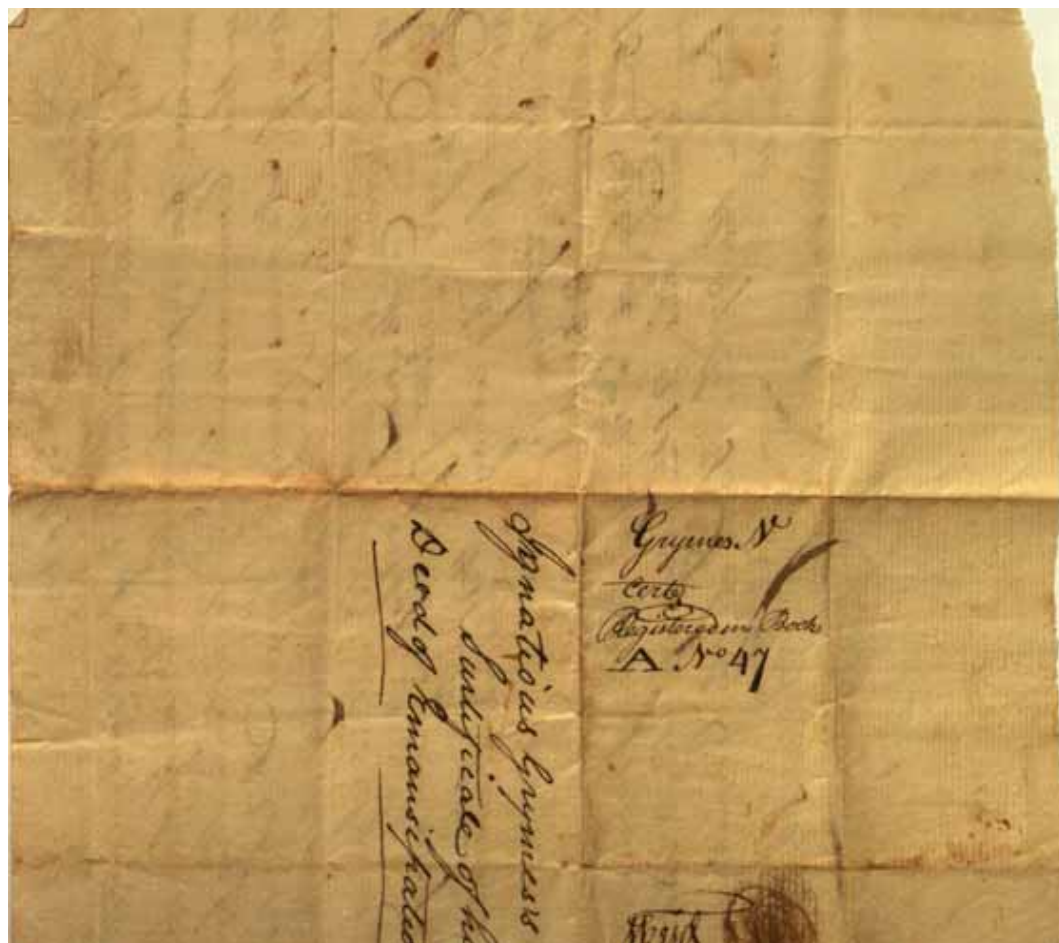

RICHMOND, *March 8, 1882.*

The act approved February 14, 1882, and now in force, and blank forms for the use of persons entitled to commutation for artificial limbs, eyes, &c., have been printed to be used by applicants, so that they may receive what is due directly from this office, thus saving to them delay and expense by way of fees to agents or attorneys. The blanks may be obtained by applying to me, or to the clerks of the county and corporation courts, to whom they will be furnished for the use of the beneficiaries; and upon their being properly made out, they will be received and filed and paid in the order of their priority, as provided by law. To do this will require time and much labor, but I beg to assure parties entitled to the benefits of the act that their claims will be promptly attended to.

In all cases give full name, residence, and post office address.

CODE OF 1873, CHAPTER 76, SECTION 17.

17. The governor, auditor of public accounts, and Dr. H. L. Thomas of the city of Richmond, who are hereby constituted a board for the purpose, are directed to contract for and furnish to every citizen of this commonwealth, who lost a leg in the late war, an artificial leg to supply the place of the one so lost: provided, that the applicant has heretofore furnished or can hereafter furnish a certificate from the court of his county or corporation, showing that he is a citizen of this state, that he lost his leg in the late war, and was a citizen of this state at the time of the loss of said leg, or in a military corps of the state: and provided further, that he has not received an artificial leg from any other state, the United States, or under the provisions of an act entitled an act to provide artificial legs for citizens of this commonwealth who lost their legs in the late war, passed January twenty-ninth, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, or the act approved November first, eighteen hundred and seventy, commonwealth who lost their legs during the late war or the act approved March twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, amending and re-enacting the same: provided further, that where the applicant has been heretofore furnished an artificial leg under the provisions of either of the above mentioned acts and cannot use said artificial leg, or that it is unfit for use, then such disabled soldier shall produce the certificate of the county court of his county, reciting the facts as required as aforesaid, and further, that such soldier was so disabled as aforesaid to such an extent that an artificial leg cannot be worn or used by him, then it shall be the duty of the auditor of public accounts, on the production of such last named certificate, to pay such soldier an amount in money equivalent to the cost of such leg, if the same could be worn by him: provided further, that in the furnishing of

limbs, or giving compensation in lieu thereof under the provisions of this act, preference shall be given to those applying who have not received the same under the provisions of former acts: provided further, that the same sum shall be paid to those who prove in like manner that they have lost arms during the late war. Colored men, who, being then residents of this state, lost legs or arms as soldiers or employees in the late war, shall be entitled to the benefits of this act.

CHAP. 125.—An ACT to provide commutation to such maimed soldiers, sailors, and marines, in lieu of artificial limbs or eyes, or otherwise disabled, as may not heretofore have received the same under the provisions of former acts.

Approved February 14, 1882.

Whereas the general appropriations heretofore made to pay commutation to soldiers, sailors, and marines maimed or disabled in war, in lieu of artificial limbs and eyes, have been exhausted; and it is represented that many soldiers, sailors, and marines entitled to such commutation have not received it; therefore,

1. Be it enacted by the general assembly of Virginia, That the sum of thirty thousand dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated out of the public treasury, to be paid as herein-after provided, to such soldiers, sailors, and marines as have not heretofore received limbs or eyes, or commutation in money for the same, under any of the acts of the general assembly heretofore passed for that purpose, and are entitled to the same in accordance with the provisions of said acts.

2. Any such soldier, sailor, or marine, disabled in such manner as to prevent the use of his limbs or eyes in manual labor, or otherwise disabled from performance of manual labor, induced by wounds or surgical operations rendered necessary thereby, who shall furnish the certificate required by the seventeenth section of chapter seventy-six of the Code of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, shall be entitled to commutation at the rate of sixty dollars each, in lieu of the limb or eye provided by law; and upon satisfactory proof that an artificial limb has been worn out, or destroyed by accident, such soldier, sailor, or marine shall be entitled to the same commutation; and should any person entitled to the benefits of this act have heretofore received only a portion of the sixty dollars, he shall be entitled to the residue: provided that any certificate now on file with the auditor of public accounts in due form shall be deemed sufficient: provided, however, that those citizens of Virginia who during temporary absence from the commonwealth enlisted in the commands of other states, shall be entitled to all the benefits of this act.

3. Hereafter the testimony upon which the certificate of the county judge is issued, shall accompany the certificate required by law; both of which shall be transmitted by the clerk of the county court to the auditor of public accounts; and it shall be the duty of the auditor to examine testimony, and unless, in his judgment, the testimony aforesaid shall make out a case of disability as required by law, he shall not issue his warrant for the commutation provided by this act.

4. The auditor of public accounts is hereby authorized to issue his warrants on the treasury to pay claims properly allowed under this act; and the same shall be paid out of the money therein not otherwise appropriated, in the order of time in which such claims may have been transmitted, or may hereafter be transmitted to the auditor as aforesaid.

5. This act shall be in force from its passage.
