State Board of Elections Establishes Advisory Review Workgroup, Expected to Adopt Cybersecurity Standards Soon



At its October 29 meeting, the State Board of Elections voted to establish a new Advisory Review Workgroup to assist the Board in carrying out its responsibilities. The Workgroup will consist of three members of the Voter Registrars Association of Virginia, three members of the Virginia Electoral Board Association, five citizen members, and two representatives of local government – one member of VACo who is recommended by the VACo President and one VML member recommended by the VML President. State Board members expressed particular interest in formally including representatives of local government, as funding partners in election administration. The workgroup will be tasked with studying and making recommendations to the Board on topics related to elections administration, as requested by the Board, and may also suggest issues for study to the Board. VACo expressed its appreciation to the Board for the inclusion of local government representation and reiterated its interest in working with the Board on the resource needs associated with elections administration.

By the end of the year, the Board is expected to adopt information technology security standards for the technology used by localities to connect to the state's voter registration system, in accordance with legislation enacted in 2019 directing that these standards be established. At the request of VACo and VML, language was added to this legislation requiring the convening of a workgroup of local IT professionals to consult on the development of the standards and to develop general cost estimates for their implementation. This workgroup, representing IT professionals from a variety of larger and smaller jurisdictions, met throughout the summer to assist with the development of the proposed standards, which the Board will consider at an upcoming meeting. As a first step, localities have been asked to conduct two self-assessments by the end of the year to establish a baseline prior to developing their elections security plans. Further details about how the Department of Elections plans to work with localities to assist with compliance are expected to be provided after the adoption of the standards.

Virginia Board of Education Prescribes New Standards of Quality and Finance Committees Hear Updated Rebenchmarking Figures



On October 16 and 17, 2019 the Virginia Board of Education (VBOE) met to finalize their revisions to the Standards of Quality (SOQs), which set minimum requirements that must be met by all local school divisions for K-12 education in Virginia. The Board voted unanimously to prescribe the revised SOQs to the Governor and General Assembly. If enacted in their current form, the fiscal impact to the state and local governments would approach \$1 billion.

As previously <u>reported</u>, VBOE reviews the SOQs every two years and typically submits their recommendations for consideration by the General Assembly in September or October as mandated by Article VIII, Section 2 of the Constitution of Virginia. However, unlike previous years, VBOE unanimously passed a <u>resolution</u> prescribing the SOQs. The last time VBOE took this action was in 1982. Two years later, the General Assembly <u>codified</u> the SOQs and VBOE submitted recommendations thereafter.

VBOE members have expressed frustration that VBOE's constitutional recommendations have been disregarded or underfunded in previous biennia by the Governor and General Assembly. Furthermore, VBOE claims that since 1988, the General Assembly has passed 197 pieces of legislation amending the SOQs. As such, prescription of the SOQs seeks to fulfill a constitutional duty and aspires to ensure that education standards across Virginia align with the priorities of VBOE. However, given the fiscal impact of the prescribed SOQs and the existing Standards outlined in Code, the practical implications of VBOE's actions remain unclear.

The final set of <u>proposals</u> contain significant changes that include increased local flexibility, but still could impose significant fiscal impacts both to state and local governments if enacted. In addition to the new requirements, VBOE specifically requested that the General Assembly remove the recession era cap on state aid to support positions. Removal of the "support cap" would yield \$371.6 million in additional state funding to localities to help pay for positions currently funded entirely by local effort.

Funding of SOQ requirements is met by a combination of state and local resources. Local ability to pay for standards with required local effort (RLE) is determined by the <u>composite index formula (LCI)</u>, which is updated every two years to account for the latest available state and local values in real property, adjusted gross income, retail sales, average daily membership of students, and total population. The Department of Education (VDOE) recently released the LCIs and trend analysis to be used in the coming biennium, which can be found <u>here</u>. The LCI data will be used to calculate the state share of K-12 funding, which will be provided in December following the release of the Governor's 2020-2022 introduced budget.

Lastly, VDOE staff gave a presentation to the Senate Finance Committee on the latest estimates for the Rebenchmarking of the Direct Aid to Public Education Budget for the 2020-2022 Biennium. The rebenchmarked budget represents the state cost of continuing the current Direct Aid programs into the next biennium, with updates to the input data used in the funding formulas that determine the cost of the programs. This technical process occurs every two years and incorporates the latest data to reflect changes in enrollment, salaries, support costs, inflation, and other factors. This process impacts localities as it helps determine RLE. The initial estimated state cost of rebenchmarking for the upcoming biennium is stated to be \$595.7 million. This represents a growth of nearly \$100 million from the last biennium.

Elevation: 3377 feet

The Limberlost Trail leads the visitor to high elevation wetlands along a walking trail. This 1.3-mile trail provides numerous opportunities for wildlife watching not the least of which is the almost fearless white-tailed deer grazing all around. The higher elevation of this area provides for exciting birding. Species such as Blackburnian, black-throated blue, hooded, and chestnut-sided warblers, veery, Acadian flycatcher and rose-breasted grosbeak all breed here. The dense stands of spruce provide perfect cover for retiring species such as Cooper's hawk and barred owl, which on occasion dart from cover to pick off their prey from along the trail. Listen in spring when the woods resonate with the booming of ruffed grouse. Along the length of the trail there are several moist boggy areas that host numerous salamanders.

VRS Lowers Assumed Rate of Return and Certifies Teacher Employer Contribution Rates



Virginia Retirement System

Over the course of two meetings on October 10 and 17, the Virginia Retirement System (VRS) Board approved a lower assumed rate of return (also referred to as the discount rate) and voted to certify to the Governor and General Assembly increased employer contribution rates for the teacher and state pension plans over the next biennium. These actions will have significant state and local fiscal impact.

On October 10, the Board voted to reduce the assumed rate of return from 7% to 6.75%. In FY 2019, VRS received a 6.7% return on its portfolio. The Board's action stems from the belief that a lower assumed rate of return more accurately reflects the challenges of near-term investment environment forecasts and establishes a reasonable rate to determine set employer contribution rates and funded status of the plans. An investment return assumption that is set too low will overstate liabilities and costs, causing current stakeholders (i.e. employer contributors) to be overcharged and future stakeholders to be undercharged. Conversely, a rate set too high will understate liabilities, undercharging current stakeholders at the expense of future stakeholders. VRS last lowered its assumed rate of return in 2010 from 7.5% to 7%.

On October 17, the Board voted to increase the <u>employer contribution rate</u> for the teacher plan from 15.68% to 16.62%. The primary driver of this increase was the newly lowered assumed rate of return and the desire to maintain the funded status of the plan by increasing employer contributions. Over the long term, actual investment returns, benefits, and expenses determine the amount of contributions. This is expressed in the basic funding equation of "Contributions + Investment returns = Benefits + Expenses." The current funded status of the Teacher Plan is approximately 74% of total liabilities, which are approximately \$13.1 billion.

The increase in contribution rates will have an annual estimated state fiscal impact of approximately \$90 million and an annual estimated local fiscal impact of approximately \$120 million. The employer contribution for the teacher plan is shared by the state and local governments in accordance with the Local Composite Index for positions recognized in the Standards of Quality (SOQs). However, the employer pension costs of any positions employed beyond these standards are borne entirely by local governments.

The Board expressed confidence that the General Assembly would commit to supporting the state share of the employer contribution rate for the plans. Final contribution rates for the statewide plans will become available following the biennium budget process. Combined with projected revenue forecasts anticipated growth in other state budget obligations such as Medicaid, K-12, and higher education, the increase in commitments to VRS are likely to add further strain to available general funds in the coming biennium.

The VRS staff actuary will present summary information for local governments at the Board's next meeting on November 20, with rates mailed to localities after January 1, 2020. Final contribution rates will be available at the conclusion of the 2020 General Assembly and will take effect on July 1, 2020 for FY 2021-2022.

The Local Government Attorneys of Virginia, Inc. (LGA), awarded its highest honor, the Edward J. Finnegan Award for Distinguished Service, to Kathleen A. Dooley, City Attorney for the City of Fredericksburg, at its recently concluded annual fall conference in Williamsburg, Virginia.

The Finnegan Award recognizes Kathleen Dooley for her significant and sustained contributions to Virginia local government law and LGA. Ms. Dooley has devoted over thirty years to local government law, serving as the City's chief counsel since 2004 after working for the Town of Blacksburg and the City of Chesapeake.

At the presentation ceremony, Ms. Dooley was recognized as "the exemplar of integrity who approaches life's challenges with honesty, zeal, and a determination to do the right thing." A former president of LGA, Ms. Dooley has served in other statewide leadership roles as a member of the Virginia Freedom of Information Advisory Council, the Virginia State Bar Committee on Legal Ethics, and the Local Government Law Section of the Virginia State Bar. She has been elected a Fellow of the Virginia Law Foundation and a Local Government Fellow of the International Municipal Lawyers Association.

In the course of advocating for Fredericksburg, Kathleen has successfully participated in significant cases that impact local government law, including before the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals on the issue of governmental prayer and the Virginia Supreme Court on vested land use rights.

LGA promotes common interests and an exchange of information among its members on legal issues that are particularly relevant to Virginia's counties, cities, and towns. The LGA's member services include conferences, a legal handbook, a monthly newsletter, and other services intended to inform and enhance the practice of local government.

UPON ARRIVAL

Check-in time for your room is 4 p.m.

Valet parking is included in the 15 percent daily charge that is automatically added to your room rate.

When you arrive, please remember that bellmen and doormen work for tips and are not compensated through any service fees collected by the hotel. These individuals should be rewarded at the guest's discretion for their superior service.
