Program Overview

Henrico County Public Schools (HCPS) middle and high school students interested in exploring

different careers had the opportunity to speak virtually with professionals in various fields through

"Live on Location" events streamed from a place of business or field location. Before the events,

students were able to talk with an HCPS Advanced Career Education (ACE) center teacher and

ask career- or program-related questions.

Students used this opportunity to further their knowledge to better understand different career

pathways and course offerings at the ACE centers. Thirty different careers were explored over

five weeks, better preparing students to choose future coursework to support their career

pathways.

Problem/Challenge/Situation Faced by Locality

Pandemic-related social distancing limitations prevented HCPS students from visiting ACE

Center programs and learning more about careers. Under normal circumstances, students would

be able to visit classrooms and experience instruction taking place with actively engaged students

demonstrating skills. In the past, this in-person student experience proved to be an important link

in helping students learn about career paths and programs offered at HCPS' two ACE centers.

Since this process was not an option in a virtual instructional model, teachers used the power of

business partnerships, personal cell phones and the Microsoft Teams application to connect with

professionals in workplace environments, enabling students to talk with professionals.

How Program Fulfilled Awards Criteria

Creating an opportunity for students, teachers, and parents to come together required the

innovation, dedication and collaboration of determined educators providing meaningful learning

opportunities regardless of health crisis limitations and restrictions. Teaching and learning

continued throughout the pandemic and staff used the power of business relationships to connect

students to the real world. While teachers remained creative and determined to engage students

and model how the workplace environment might change, our primary mission of educating

students remained first. Businesses were able to share the same sentiment and show how

individual employees who are creative problem-solvers are valued, despite a changing world. The

public health crisis may have changed the environment, but the mission has remained the same.

How Program Was Carried Out

Live on Location events from December 2020 - January 2021, as well as pre-event activities,

provided middle and high school students and their parents and guardians with the chance to

further their knowledge about different career pathways and course offerings at HCPS ACE

centers. Thirty different careers were explored over a period of five weeks, better preparing

students to choose future course work to support their career pathways. Participating students

that helped with the event were in-person students who volunteered to help. The students (and

their parents and guardians who attended the event) were current 10th grade students from

schools across Henrico County.

Program Objectives were designed to:

Provide an opportunity for HCPS students and parents the opportunity to learn more about

career pathways and courses available at ACE Centers.

• Provide the opportunity for students to talk directly with career professionals.

• Enhance students' knowledge regarding different career pathways in order to assist with

high school course selection and post-secondary planning.

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• Provide enrichment opportunities in the curriculum and increase student engagement by

encouraging students to think about their career plans.

Development

The program was a concerted effort by both Highland Springs and Hermitage ACE center faculty

and staff to continue encouraging and engaging students in conversation about careers despite

COVID-19 restrictions. Teachers used existing community and business partnerships that

demonstrated an interest in supporting student growth.

Existing technology resources were used, including the Microsoft Teams application and staff

smartphones, to transmit live video for students to view from home on their HCPS-issued laptops.

A Bitly generator was used to track the number of attendees.

The event was open to all HCPS middle and high school students and their parents or guardians

without mitigating factors such as transportation, permission forms or intrusion on traditional

instructional time. Wi-Fi hot spots were provided to any student without access to the internet.

The event was strategically scheduled outside of instructional time so all students could

participate at their discretion. A digital flyer with links to each event was shared with all HCPS

middle and high school students, so individuals had direct control of their own learning

opportunities. Thirty careers were highlighted with business partners representing racial, gender

and demographic diversity.

Financing and Staffing

The cost of the program was negligible, considering each student had a school-issued laptop.

Teachers incurred a minimal cost for gas to attend events, usually within a couple of miles from

either ACE Center. Communication for the event was electronic therefore, no printing costs were incurred. The network connection was through personal hot-spot devices, incurring no additional cost.

Program Results

Below is a table of the number of attendances for virtual and Live on Location events by program.

There were a total of 2,976 attendances for the entire event.

Student responses were very positive, resulting in more than 800 ACE applications to date for the 2021-22 school year.

pathways. There were a total of 2,976 attendances for the entire event. Student responses were




