The <u>Virginia American Revolution 250 Commission (VA250)</u> was created by the General Assembly for the purpose of commemorating the 250th anniversary of Virginia's participation in American independence. The Commission is composed of legislative leaders, tourism and economic development officials, historians, and experts across a wide spectrum.

The 250th anniversary of American independence holds tremendous educational, economic, and tourism opportunities for the Commonwealth. Not only was Virginia a central focus of the American Revolution in the 1770's and 1780's, but it is still at the center, in terms of what visitors can see and experience today.

There are hundreds of related sites throughout Virginia that serve to better educate people as to the pivotal role the Commonwealth held in independence. That geographic dispersal means visitors do not have to travel to a specific place to experience the history. Further, the Commission is resolved to plan a statewide commemoration that is **multi-faceted and inclusive** of the diverse individuals, histories, sites, stories, and communities that define Virginia.

To position Virginia as a key leader in this national commemoration, the Commission requests that each locality form a Local VA250 Committee to join in the planning for this large-scale commemoration. Further, we ask localities to designate a liaison to work and communicate with the Commission.

Localities that form official Local VA250 Committees by **passing a resolution of support**, **designating a local contact, and forming a Local VA250 Committee**, the state commission will provide **grant funding opportunities** for commemorative events and make available programs to include traveling exhibitions and teacher resources.

Regions 5 and 7 Discuss Housing, Solar, Workforce, and More in Fluvanna County



Fluvanna County hosted representatives of VACo Regions 5 and 7 on July 12 for a robust discussion of regional priorities, including updates from Delegate Sally Hudson and Delegate Tara Durant on top issues in the General Assembly and opportunities to collaborate with local governments. Fluvanna County Vice Chair Tony O'Brien welcomed attendees, and VACo President Meg Bohmke extended a special welcome to newly-elected Supervisors, noting VACo's work to build relationships with the new Administration and its long tradition of nonpartisan work on behalf of counties.

During a roundtable discussion, county representatives shared issues of concern in their communities. Issues raised included the continued need for infrastructure investment, such as funding for broadband, water, and sewer projects; challenges associated with the Children's Services Act and limitations on using CSA funds to serve children in the public school setting; the need for a stronger partnership with the state in funding K-12 education; and the importance of restoring the distribution of recordation tax revenues to localities outside of Northern Virginia that existed prior to 2020.

Delegate Sally Hudson and Delegate Tara Durant discussed priority issues they are pursuing in advance of the next legislative session; addressing the shortage of school bus drivers is a shared concern. Delegate Hudson expressed her interest in providing localities with additional flexibility to address housing affordability, as well as in improving data collection on power outages. Delegate Durant discussed recent regional discussions on affordable housing, and noted that she is examining models from other states in addressing learning loss resulting from the pandemic.

Discussion ensued among attendees and the legislators, including further conversation regarding bus driver shortages and broader workforce needs and affordable housing. Attendees discussed the intersection of housing affordability and local revenue options and its connection with state funding and mandates on local government, and the need for workforce housing and walkable communities to meet residents' quality of life concerns.

Joe Lerch concluded the meeting with a brief presentation on issues related to solar and related alternative energy sources. Legislation introduced at VACo's request and passed in 2022 requires the State Corporation Commission to examine the life cycle of solar and wind energy devices, including battery storage. Another bill requires the Virginia Cooperative Extension to map prime agricultural soils and forestlands in order to assist with siting large solar installations. Virginia Cooperative Extension has also been directed to work with utilities to review capacity within the electric grid.

VACo thanks the county representatives, legislators, and business partners who participated in the meeting, and extends its special appreciation to Fluvanna County and to Cunningham Creek Winery for hosting the event.

Dinwiddie County Hosts Regions 1 and 4 for Discussion of Economic Development, School Capital Needs, and More



Dinwiddie County hosted representatives of VACo Regions 1 and 4 and three members of the area's General Assembly delegation on July 21 for VACo's fourth regional meeting of the year. Dinwiddie County Chairman and former VACo President Harrison Moody set the stage for a collaborative conversation by offering a warm welcome to the County.

Representatives of the 11 counties who participated in the meeting shared their major challenges and priorities for legislative action as part of a roundtable discussion. Issues raised included a strong interest among several attendees in additional options to raise revenues for school capital projects, through continued state appropriations as well as by allowing interested localities to impose a 1 percent sales tax for school capital projects if approved by referendum (authority that has been granted to nine localities). Several county representatives highlighted the strain on local law enforcement imposed by overcrowding at state hospitals, which has resulted in lengthy waits in emergency rooms with individuals subject to temporary detention orders. Other common themes included the challenges in recruiting and retaining volunteer fire and EMS personnel in rural areas; the need for transportation

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improvements on major corridors as well as the need to address overdue road maintenance (such as ditch cleaning); the need for full state funding of Constitutional offices; economic development (to include the infrastructure needed to support growth); and workforce challenges in the public sector, including public safety staff and teachers. Several county representatives expressed their interest in encouraging young people to remain in the area.

Delegate Emily Brewer provided updates on major actions taken by the 2022 General Assembly and her priorities for the upcoming 2023 session and responded to items raised by counties during the roundtable discussion. She echoed the importance of encouraging younger residents to remain in rural communities, noting her efforts to refine the G3 workforce development program to target the needs of particular regions, and encouraging members to participate in the Governor's Summit on Rural Prosperity, which will be held October 12 and 13. She highlighted several successes

in the recently-adopted state budget, including additional funding for law enforcement and a large infusion to the Virginia Retirement System to improve the funded status of the plans. A priority for the upcoming session is ensuring that rural communities can benefit from the Smart Scale program, as well as continued work on behavioral health. Delegate Kim Taylor underscored the importance of economic development for the region, and indicated her particular interest in working to improve opportunities in agriculture. Delegate Otto Wachsmann noted that TDOs have been cited as a top priority issue in his meetings with sheriffs. He applauded the work of electric co-ops in the deployment of rural broadband.

Kevin Massengill, Dinwiddie County Administrator, and Tammie Collins, Deputy County Administrator, Planning and Community Development, made a brief presentation about economic development in the County, in particular the County's efforts to develop a home-grown workforce for local businesses. The County's Youth Workforce Development Initiative exposes students to job opportunities in the community, in partnership with the school system, community college, and local businesses. Students are paid for their work through a combination of seed money appropriated by the Board of Supervisors, support from local businesses, and a grant from the regional community action agency. Mr. Massengill provided an overview of the County's relationship with the Virginia Motorsports Park, which is the largest tourist attraction in the area and generates revenue for the County through an admissions tax charged on each ticket.

VACo is grateful to Dinwiddie County for hosting a robust discussion and to Virginia Motorsports Park for allowing attendees to visit this important part of the region's economy. County representatives and legislators provided critical information that will help VACo develop its draft legislative program, and VACo appreciates their participation.



I-81 Corridor Improvement Plan Continues Progress



Members of the I-81 Advisory Committee from across the Commonwealth gathered in Roanoke on July 7 to discuss the status of the I-81 Corridor Improvement Plan. The role of the <u>Committee</u> is to advise or make any recommendations to the Commonwealth Transportation Board regarding the Plan. The meeting was positive in that updates to Interstate-81, and other related modes of transportations along the corridor, are being completed on time and the projects have the necessary funding.

Regarding general business of the I-81 Advisory Committee, the meeting in Roanoke was attended by Virginia Secretary of Transportation Sheppard "Shep" Miller III, and his staff. Delegate Terry Austin (District 19) was elected the Chair of the committee while Delegate Tony Wilt (District 26) was elected Vice-Chair. Phil North, Chair of the VACo Transportation Steering Committee, also attended the meeting as a member of the I-81 Advisory Committee and Chair of the Roanoke Valley/Alleghany PDC. The committee will meet later this year at an undetermined date.

The success of Interstate-81 is critical to the success of western Virginia. I-81 is the

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main artery of transportation through this area and sees \$312 billion in goods while also accounting for 42% of Virginia's interstate truck vehicle miles traveled. To date, there have been 23 completed projects while there are currently 15 projects underway. The 15 projects currently being worked on include:

- Road widening (2 projects, scheduled completion date 2026)
- Acceleration and deceleration lane extensions (11 projects, 7 will be completed in 2022 while 4 more are to be finished in 2023)
- Additional truck climbing lane (1 to be completed in 2024)
- Auxiliary lane (1 to be completed in 2022)

In total there are, as of now, 26 remaining projects for the Plan and these are anticipated to be completed by 2033. Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) staff relayed to the Committee that operational improvements such as 30 digital messaging signs, 51 additional traffic cameras, extended safety services patrols, detour route improvements and improved incident clearance have all been completed in the VDOT system and that the locality systems should be completed in 2025. The next topic of discussion was the I-81 Multimodal Improvement Plan which highlighted updates and information regarding <u>Virginia Breeze</u>. Virginia Breeze is the Statesponsored intercity bus service that runs 7 days a week, 365 days a year. It currently services two routes that use Interstate-81, the Blacksburg to Washington, D.C. route (Valley Flyer) and the Bristol to Washington, D.C. route (Highlands Rhythm). The Virginia Breeze is a low-cost mode of transportation to connect rural communities to other parts of the Commonwealth. Staff from the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT) stated that the Virginia Breeze service performs very well. The Service has an 85% on time performance rate and a farebox recovery rate (% of cost covered by fares) of 52%. In comparison, the national average is somewhere between a 20-30% farebox recovery rate. DRPT staff went on to state that 110,000 rides have been serviced since December 2017 and the allowance of pre-booked tickets forewarns the Department in case they need to accommodate demand with added busses, such as around holidays. The full presentation on Virginia Breeze by DRPT may be found here.

The Virginia Passenger Rail Authority (VPRA) then spoke to the Committee on passenger rail updates. The \$100 million in I-81 funding will be a critical part of the \$300 million in western Virginia rail funding, which is part of the \$3.7 billion rail deal signed in 2021 with CSX and Amtrak. This allows the second Roanoke Amtrak train to operate (The line began July 11th, 2022) and a 2026 extension of passenger rail to the New River Valley (NRV). Ridership on rail in Roanoke hit a record 220,000 passengers in 2019 while to date in 2022, we see similar ridership trends. With the extension of the route to the NRV, the VPRA expects 80,000 new rides a year from the New River Valley to D.C. The extension to the NRV will be through the purchase of 28 miles of track from Norfolk Southern

which was finalized in June 2022. To read more on this and other rail updates, the full presentation can be found <u>here.</u>

The financial overview of the program was next on the agenda. After reviewing some history of the creation of funding opportunities for the Program, the general sense is that the Program is well funded and ahead of time for completion. New projections over the life of the program will cost \$2.7 billion through 2033 which is slightly more than the initial estimate of \$2.87 billion through 2038. All debt that is issued through the life of the Program (municipal bonds and Transportation Infrastructure Financing Innovation Act) will be supported by the I-81 Regional Fuels Tax. A breakdown of the program's financial status can be found <u>here</u>.

Lastly, the Office of the Secretary of Transportation gave an update on the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and how it directly helps Virginia and Interstate-81. They made sure to state that the Youngkin Administration is committed to supporting applications for federal funding as they view this large amount of available funding as an opportunity to leverage Virginia's resources. The Administration will provide technical assistance to localities or agencies in drafting competitive applications and provide letters of support for IIJA project applications. Of the \$550 billion in new federal funding, Virginia will directly receive at least \$10.5 billion over the course of FY 22-26, with opportunities for more funding through competitive grants. Interstate-81 will see funding directly from the IIJA for bridge rehabilitation and replacement in Botetourt County (I-81 over Route 640 and Route 670). Furthermore, the IIJA gives around \$114 million in funding through the Interstate Operations and Enhancement Program that allows I-81 projects to advance sooner.

<u>General Fund Revenue Surplus</u>



Governor Youngkin announced last week that the state ended FY 2022 with a \$1.94 billion General Fund (GF) revenue surplus. The Governor will present more detailed information to the "money committees" on August 19, but based on the preliminary figures in the Governor's July 21 announcement, state GF revenue collections far outpaced the forecast of 8.5 percent growth, generating 16.3 percent growth relative to FY 2021. Payroll withholding and sales tax collections, major components of GF revenues, exceeded their forecasts, with payroll withholding growing at 9.5 percent (relative to 9 percent forecast of 6.5 percent.

Language in the recently-adopted biennium budget earmarks the first \$585 million from these surplus revenues that is not required to meet a Constitutionally-mandated deposit to the state Revenue Stabilization Fund or the Water Quality Improvement Fund, as follows:

- \$250 million for a lump sum payment to the Virginia Retirement System to reduce unfunded liabilities
- \$150 million for improvements to Interstate 64 between exit 205 and exit 234
- \$50 million for the Virginia Business Ready Sites Program Fund
- \$100 million for capital projects
- \$35.5 million for deposit to the Major Headquarters Workforce Grant Fund

The following day, the Governor announced another piece of positive economic news for the Commonwealth, as Virginia's unemployment rate fell to 2.8 percent in June. According to the Virginia Employment Commission, relative to June 2021, the largest year-over-year job growth was experienced in leisure and hospitality, followed by education and health services. All ten metropolitan areas saw job growth between June 2021 and June 2022, with the largest growth in Northern Virginia, followed by Richmond. The Governor noted in his press release that the state's labor force participation rate remained unchanged at 63.8 percent, and indicated that increasing this metric will be an area of focus for the Administration.

Several important economic indicators will be released this week, including Gross Domestic Product calculations for the second quarter and the Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index, and all eyes are on the Federal Reserve Open Market Committee meeting on July 26 and 27. After the July 13 release of the updated Consumer Price Index, which indicated that the CPI had increased by 9.1 percent for the 12 months ending in June, the largest 12-month increase since the period ending in November 1981, Committee members are expected to announce another interest rate increase to try to tame increasingly worrisome levels of inflation.

Alternative Custody Workgroup Discusses Challenges and Opportunities at Second Meeting



The workgroup studying options to increase the use of alternative custody arrangements for individuals who are subject to an emergency custody order (ECO) or a temporary detention order (TDO) met for the second time on July 12 and discussed in more depth several topics that were initially raised at the group's first meeting. This workgroup was established by legislation passed during the 2022 General Assembly session (SB 202, Newman) in response to the continuing stresses on law enforcement agencies posed by delayed admissions to inpatient psychiatric care.

Jonathan Green, Director of Magistrate Services with the Supreme Court of Virginia, outlined challenges in the current alternative transportation process (and the recent statutory expansion to authorize the transfer of custody to the alternative transportation provider) from magistrates' perspective. Under current law, an alternative transportation provider must be identified to the magistrate (who may not otherwise be aware of all the resources available in each county he or she serves); the magistrate then evaluates whether the proposed alternative transportation provider is available, willing, and able to safely transport the individual subject to the temporary detention order. While the state's contracted provider, Allied Universal, is one alternative transportation provider, other possibilities are allowed under the law, including friends and relatives of the individual. The statutory changes enacted in 2022 allow an alternative transportation provider to assume custody of the individual, but the magistrate's decision in ordering alternative transportation is made based on factors involving transporting the individual. Given the lengthy wait times in recent months, the period of custody may be far longer than the time it takes to transport the individual to the inpatient facility. As Mr. Green noted, "It is one thing to analyze whether a proposed [alternative transportation provider] can safely transport a respondent to a designated location in the confines of a vehicle. Determining whether a proposed [alternative transportation provider] can safely maintain custody of a person in a hospital ED for 24 or more hours would seem to require a different analysis, yet the current statutory language focuses only on transportation."

Sheriff Jeremy A. Falls of Fauquier County underscored the challenges facing law enforcement under the current ECO/TDO system, but also outlined some promising approaches toward improving the process. While lengthy waits in the emergency department place a strain on the department, which must patrol an area of 651 square miles with six or seven deputies on duty at any given time, the Crisis Intervention Team Assessment Center (CITAC) in neighboring Culpeper has drastically shortened deputies' time required for ECOs. The County's co-responder program, established in partnership with Rappahannock Rapidan Community Services, involves the participation of a therapist who helps to provide resources to individuals in crisis and avert the need for ECOs or TDOs. The County is interested in expanding the hours a therapist is on duty and also in establishing a satellite CITAC to expand capacity.

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Sarah Owen, Legislative Aide to Senator Steve Newman, provided an outline of legislation carried by the Senator in 2022 that seeks to expand auxiliary police officers' ability to execute ECOs and TDOs, with appropriate training. Ms. Owen explained that the legislation is intended to add an option for law enforcement to transfer custody of individuals who may not meet the criteria for alternative transportation, and suggested that the legislature would be open to further changes in the law to refine the ECO/TDO process.

Suzanne Mayo and Gail Paysour of the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) presented information on the state's current contract for alternative transportation and how it compares to efforts in other states. The contract, which is up for renewal at the end of the month, currently covers transportation only, and the addition of alternative custody would be a change in its scope. The legislature allocated \$2 million in FY 2023 for alternative custody, which would allow for a pilot program to be established. Ms. Mayo noted that Virginia's commitment laws, with a short ECO period relative to other states paired with a "bed of last resort" law, are unique relative to other states. Other states have implemented psychiatric observation units in emergency departments or psychiatricspecific emergency departments. Allied Universal provides alternative transportation in other states, but on a hospital-by-hospital basis and not statewide. Since Allied Universal is currently only able to meet a relatively small portion of the need for alternative transportation in Virginia, DBHDS is currently funding a pilot program in which it supplies hourly payments for off-duty law enforcement officers to maintain custody of individuals subject to TDOs. This program is intended to provide some relief to law enforcement agencies through the establishment of Memoranda of Understanding with individual agencies, which allows customization based on a locality's needs, but also requires a large number of individual MOUs to be developed.

Workgroup members discussed the potential for alternative custody and transportation to be supplied based on regional contracts, the possibility of revising current statutory eligibility requirements for ECOs and TDOs, and the need to consider providing additional resources to programming that has been shown to work (such as CITACs), among other facets of this complicated issue. The workgroup's next meeting is scheduled for August 9.

JLARC Presents VRS Oversight Report



As part of their July 6 <u>meeting</u>, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) presented an oversight report of the Virginia Retirement System (VRS) as required by the <u>Code of Virginia</u>. The health and well-being of VRS is important to local governments as it administers retirement programs and other benefit programs for state and local government employees, including teachers. VRS receives funds from employer contributions, employee contributions, and investment income.

While information on returns is still being finalized, VRS reported good news that as of March 2022, the annual return was 12.3 percent, and the total VRS Trust fund grew by \$10 billion to exceed a high of \$106.3 billion in assets. Total returns were all above long-term return assumptions, though fiscal year returns are expected to be lower. Investment returns are a key source of income for VRS, and meeting or exceeding VRS investment benchmarks is critical to ensuring that employer contributions meant to amortize long-term unfunded liabilities remain low.

As previously <u>reported</u>, the health of the VRS Teachers plan was sufficient enough for the VRS Board of Trustees to recommend lowered employer contribution rates for the FY 2023 and FY 2024 biennium. However, the General Assembly opted to maintain the existing contribution rate from the previous biennium. They additionally opted to deposit \$750 million in FY 2022 into the VRS trust fund and earmark \$250 million of undesignated FY 2022 surplus revenues for an additional deposit to VRS. VACo has traditionally supported and encouraged such actions by the General Assembly as a prudent use of General Funds that yields long-term benefits to both state and local governments. The higher Teachers plan rates are estimated to yield \$500 million in savings over the next 15 years while the deposits of general funds could result in an additional estimated savings of \$2 billion over the next 20 years.

The VRS Board of Trustees also recently appointed Andrew H. Junkin as Chief Investment Officer (CIO). Mr. Junkin is the current CIO for Rhode Island's retirement programs and previous president of Wilshire Consulting. Mr. Junkin will begin serving in September 2022 and the current CIO will remain at VRS through 2022 to facilitate transition.

VRS serves more than 751,000 actives and retired members. Based on assets, VRS is the 17th largest public and private pension systems in the United States, and 46th largest in the world. VRS was created on July 1, 1942, and is celebrating 80 years of service this year. The full actuarial report and slides from meeting can be found <u>here</u>.



VIRGINIA OUTDOORS FOUNDATION \$2 million available in latest grant round for open space projects

The Virginia Outdoors Foundation is making \$1.8 million available from its Preservation Trust Fund program and \$200,000 from its Get Outdoors Fund for grants that protect open space for public use and other public benefits.

Preservation Trust Fund grants for the fall 2022 grant round will prioritize projects that result in significant public access, but may also be used for projects that protect exceptional conservation values such as water quality, historic and cultural resources, wildlife habitat, and high-quality farmland and forestland. A real estate interest must either be acquired by a local government or conveyed to VOF to be eligible for funding, and protection must meet the requirements of Virginia's Open-Space Land Act. There is no minimum or maximum on Preservation Trust Fund grants, but historically they have averaged approximately \$150,000.

Get Outdoors Fund grants may be used to fund projects that create, protect, expand, or enhance access to open space in underserved communities. Proposals up to \$25,000 may be considered.

The Get Outdoors Fund requires pre-applications to be submitted through <u>VOF's online grants</u> <u>portal</u> by August 10, 2022. Invitations to submit a full application will be issued within one week of pre-application receipt. No more than 25 applicants will be invited to submit a full application. If an organization has been awarded more than \$5,000 in a past grant round, the previous project must be completed before an applicant may reapply. Past applicants must submit new preapplications. A resubmitted pre-application without significant revision will not be considered. In addition, applicants may not apply more than twice with the same concept.

Full applications for both programs must be submitted online using our <u>grants application</u> <u>portal</u>. Full applications must be submitted by August 22, 2022. Grant awards will be announced sometime in October. Eligibility requirements, sample applications, and other materials may be found online at <u>https://vof.org/ptf</u> and <u>https://vof.org/go</u>. VOF encourages potential applicants to contact staff prior to applying to discuss eligibility and seek guidance on producing a successful application. 
Maximizing Your Cash In a Rising Rate Environment

Proposed Reapportionment and Bylaw Amendment

The VACo Bylaws provide for reapportionment every ten years beginning in 1991. The VACo President named a reapportionment committee in 2021 and the committee began the process when the census data was available. The committee presented its recommendations to the VACo Board of Directors at its meeting on June 4, 2022. The Board of Directors accepted the recommendation of the committee which would add three seats to the VACo Board of Directors consisting of one rural, one suburban and one urban area seat. The Board also endorsed a proposed Bylaw amendment which would allow the three seats to be added to the Board of Directors. The proposed reapportioned map of regions and the Bylaw proposal are as follows.

The Membership of the association will vote on the proposed Bylaw amendment at its Annual meeting on November 15, 2022.

Article IX entitled *Board of Directors,* shall be amended in Section 2 by adding the words **Regional Directors** and deleting the words **twenty four members** as indicated below.

ARTICLE IX

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Authority and Responsibility. The governing body of this Association shall be the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall have supervision, control, and direction of the affairs of the Association, its committees, and its publications; shall determine its policies or changes therein; and shall actively prosecute its objectives.

Section 2. Composition and Election. The Board of Directors shall consist of the President, The President-Elect, the First Vice-President, the Second Vice-President, the Secretary-Treasurer, the Immediate Past-President, the three next most recent Virginia

Association of Counties past-presidents who currently hold office as elected Virginia county supervisors who may serve only for 3 more years after their term as immediate past president, and **Regional Directors** twenty-four members elected on a "one person - one vote" basis from compact and contiguous Regions into which the State shall be divided for purposes of representation. Such regional directors shall be selected at the annual meeting by the member counties located within the region which the director will represent. The Board of Directors shall designate at least one member of the Board to represent the Association on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Counties. Any county supervisor who serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Counties shall also serve as an ex-officio member of the VACo Board of Directors.

Section 3. Qualification. Only elected county supervisors representing Virginia counties in good standing shall be eligible to stand for election to the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Term. Regional Directors shall be elected for two-year staggered terms with approximately fifty percent of its members elected and installed at each Annual Business Meeting. No Regional Directors shall serve more than four full consecutive terms. Any tenure as an officer of the Association shall not be included as any part of the tenure of the aforementioned four consecutive terms. The Regional Directors elected and installed at the Annual Business Meeting shall assume office immediately after the close of such meeting. Such Directors shall hold office until their successors are elected and installed. No Director shall continue to hold office after formally leaving office as an elected Virginia county supervisor. Past presidents may serve in that capacity for only three more years after their service as Immediate Past President.

Section 5. Reapportionment. Beginning in 1991, and every ten years thereafter, regional representation on the Board of Directors shall be reapportioned.

Section 6. Meetings. The Board of Directors shall hold quarterly regular meetings at such time and such place as the Board may prescribe. Notice of all such meetings shall be given to the members not less than thirty days before the meeting is held. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President or at the request of any three Directors elected from separate Regions of the Association. Meetings of the Board of Directors may be held by conference call or other electronic means and votes may be taken.

Section 7. Quorum. At any meeting of the Board of Directors, the members present, and voting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the Association. Any such business thus transacted shall be valid providing it is affirmatively passed by upon by a majority of those members present and voting.

Section 8. Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors between Annual Business Meetings shall be filled by the Board. A Director so elected to fill a vacancy shall serve the unexpired term of the predecessor.


