Our History

1940: Fire Training Need Identified;

1969: VDE established Fire Services Training Section;

1978: Fire Services Training section established as separate office; reports to Secretary of Public Safety;

1981: Office of Fire Services Training combined with VA State Fire Services Commission to create VDFP and its policy making board – the Virginia Fire Services Board (VFSB);

1985 to Present:

Funding sources established: VA Fire Programs Fund; assesses 1 percent of five lines of insurance (homeowners, farm owners, marine, fire, etc.) State Fire Marshal's Office joins VDFP - 2008










Virginia Fire and EMS Needs Assessment and Survey

- Released through a partnership between VaCo, VML, and VDFP
- 87% response rate (86% of counties)
- Total of 19,299 fire and EMS providers
- 91% reported a decline in volunteers
- 18% of localities cannot meet OEMS standards, 70% of localities cannot meet NFPA staffing recommendations
- Call volume from 2021-2023 rose by 40%
- State funding has risen by 6.67% during the same time
- 20% of frontline apparatus is over 20 years old




Overarching Issues

- Funding is not sustainable with rising costs and rising call volume
- Some localities are not able to provide adequate service to citizens
- Personnel (volunteer or career) and apparatus/ambulance costs were the most prevalent issue
- Virginia General Assembly must address these issues to enable future growth in the Commonwealth
