Governor Takes Final Action on Legislation, Budget



On Friday, May 2, Governor Youngkin announced his final actions on legislation that was returned to him from the April 2 reconvened session. At the reconvened session, the General Assembly had rejected the Governor's amendments, in whole or part, to 91 bills, and rejected 172 of the 205 budget amendments proposed by the Governor, returning these items for final action within a 30-day deadline. For the bills returned to him in this posture, the Governor had the option to sign or veto the legislation, or to take no action and allow the bills to become law without his signature. The Governor signed 53 of the bills that were returned to him, and vetoed 38 bills. Similarly, the Governor could sign or veto the entire budget bill, or take no action; the Governor also had the option to sign the budget overall and exercise his line-item veto authority to eliminate specific appropriations. The Governor signed the budget with 37 line-item vetoes, as discussed below.

Governor's Budget Actions

The Governor indicated that his May 2 budget vetoes, when added to the \$50 million in balances available over the biennium after actions taken during the reconvened session, would result in a "cushion" of \$900.4 million in the event of a decline in revenues as a result of actions taken at the federal level. Although he expressed his belief that the state will meet the revenue forecast incorporated into the budget as introduced in December 2024, he evinced some concern about short-term risks to FY 2026 revenues. The line-item vetoes largely affected capital projects (representing \$691.3 million in savings) and certain housing, natural resources, and economic development-related items. The funding for the functional elimination of the K-12 "support cap" remains intact.

Several items of interest to local governments were vetoed:

- **First-time homebuyer program**: This item would have provided \$15 million in FY 2025 to establish the First-Time Homebuyer Grant Program, which would award grants of up to \$10,000 in costs incurred by eligible homebuyers in purchasing direct ownership in residential real property.
- **Rental assistance pilot program**: This item would have provided \$20 million in FY 2025 for a rental assistance pilot program in Planning Districts 8 and 23.
- Local housing trust funds: This item would have provided \$13 million in FY 2025 for grants to localities or planning district commissions that have established or will establish by December 31, 2025, a local Housing Trust Fund for long-term local investments related to affordable housing (\$5 million of this funding was earmarked for Prince William County, \$1 million for the City of Emporia, and \$250,000 for Tazewell County for remediation of blighted properties in the Town of Richlands).
- **Urban Public-Private Partnership Redevelopment Fund**: This item would have provided \$2.5 million in FY 2025 to capitalize the Urban Public-Private Partnership Redevelopment Fund, which is intended to make grants or loans to local governments to assist in assembling, planning, clearing, and remediating sites for redevelopment, and directed the Department of Housing and Community Development to develop criteria and guidelines for the administration of the grant program.
- **Clean Energy Innovation Bank**: These vetoes, unlike other vetoes that eliminate spending items, restore funding for the Bank by undoing actions taken by the General Assembly to eliminate authority and funding for this initiative, as the Governor vetoed the legislation establishing the Bank in 2024.
- **Tourism marketing**: This item would have provided \$1.25 million in FY 2025 for a marketing campaign to attract out of state visitors from Black, Indigenous, and Hispanic communities.
- **Employee Child Care Assistance Pilot Program**: This item would have provided \$25 million in FY 2025 to establish and operate the Employee Child Care Assistance Pilot Program, which would have provided matching funds to incentivize employers to contribute to the child care costs of their employees.
- **Alternatives to state hospitalization**: This item would have increased support for pilot programs for individuals with dementia or geriatric individuals who may otherwise be admitted to state hospitals by \$1 million in FY 2026.
- **Community Flood Preparedness Fund**: This item would have deposited \$50 million in FY 2025 to the Virginia Community Flood Preparedness Fund.
- **Groundwater research**: This item would have provided \$2.3 million in FY 2025 for groundwater research in the Eastern Groundwater Management Area.
- **School Resource Officer Incentive Grants**: This item would have designated fund balances within the program to be used for digital mapping projects for emergency response and for continuation of previous grants, as well as providing an increase of \$30,000 for administration of the Drug Abuse Resistance Education program.
- **Impacts of highway development**: This item would have provided \$250,000 in FY 2025 for a study of the impact of the development of the state's highway system on African American communities.
- **Impacts of federal policy changes**: One item would have required the Department of Taxation to provide estimated fiscal impacts of any changes to federal income tax policy within 30 business days of their enactment and directed the Governor to submit a budget bill within 20 business

days of receiving the estimated fiscal impacts if the cumulative projected impact of the federal changes would decrease general fund revenues by more than \$100 million in the current or succeeding fiscal year. The second item would have required an estimated fiscal impact to be provided within 30 days of the enactment of federal changes that affect federal grant revenue by at least \$100 million in the current or succeeding fiscal year, and directed the Governor to consult with General Assembly leadership about a special session if federal grant reductions resulted in additional state General Fund expenditures being required that exceeded 1 percent of the General Fund operating budget in the current or succeeding fiscal year.

Governor's Actions on Bills

At the April 2 reconvened session, the General Assembly rejected the Governor's amendments to several bills of interest to local governments, returning those bills to the Governor as passed by the legislature for final action. The Governor's actions on these bills are detailed below:

Data centers: HB 1601 (Thomas)/SB 1449 (Ebbin), as passed by the General Assembly, would have required an applicant for a rezoning, or special use permit, for a data center (defined as a "High Energy Use Facility" or HEUF) to submit a sound study on potential impacts to any housing or schools within 500 feet of its property boundary. The legislation also required a locality, when considering such application, to require the electric utility providing power to the proposed data center, to submit a report on (1) any new or existing electric substations that will be used to serve the HEUF; and (2) the anticipated transmission voltage required to serve the HEUF. The Governor's April 2 amendments would have removed these mandates; the Governor also proposed a reenactment clause, effectively nullifying the legislation by requiring the General Assembly to adopt it again in 2026 to make it effective.

• Governor's May 2 action: Vetoed.

Tax exemptions for certain organizations: HB 1699 (Askew), as passed by the General Assembly, would have eliminated the recordation tax exemption for the Virginia Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and eliminated the real and personal property tax exemption for this group and several other entities. The Governor's April 2 amendments would have added a reenactment clause to the bill and directed the Department of Taxation to study the impact of exemptions to the state recordation tax on state government revenues and the exemptions to real and personal property tax by classifications set or designations made on or before July 1, 1971, and the impact of such exemptions on local government revenues.

• Governor's May 2 action: Vetoed.

Employer liability: HB 1730 (Delaney) and SB 894 (Perry), as passed by the General Assembly, establish an expansive legal framework for holding employers liable in civil actions involving victims who have been harmed by an employee's actions. This would create a great burden on public employers, who by the very nature of providing services for the public would be subject to claims and liability related to the acts of employees that they may not be able to foresee or anticipate. The Governor's April 2 amendments were helpful to localities as employers, as they would have created more feasible standards of employer responsibility for employees' actions and also narrowed the definition of "vulnerable victim."

• Governor's May 2 action: Approved the legislation, which will become law as passed by the General Assembly in February.

VACo 2025 Top Funding Priority Achieved!



As part of the General Assembly's Conference report budget and Governor Youngkin's May 2 final actions for the 2025 General Assembly Session, VACo's top funding priority was achieved by the functional elimination of the cap on recognition of K-12 support positions. This action provides \$222.9 million in FY 2026 in funding to local governments to fund positions at a ratio that corresponds with prevailing local practice. This action has been long sought by VACo and its advocacy partners during the 15 years the cap has been in place. The General Assembly had made incremental progress recently to close what was originally a more than \$400 million gap in funding. With this final action, the level of support position funding from the state has been restored to pre-Great Recession levels.

As previously <u>reported</u>, VACo and advocacy partners worked with the Joint Subcommittee on Elementary and Secondary Education Funding to ensure that the repeal of the support cap was the top recommendation of the subcommittee to the General Assembly. This follows the recommendations from the landmark 2023 Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) study, which revealed that state support for K-12 education in Virginia was being underfunded by billions of dollars. While the functional elimination of the support cap represents a significant first step, there is more work to be done to improve education funding in the Commonwealth.

Additionally, the finalized budget contains approximately \$53 million in FY 2026 for a special education add-on. This is a major development as local revenues cover 69% of the cost of special education in Virginia, with the remaining 19% and 11% being paid by the state and federal government respectively. The joint subcommittee also made a recommendation to the General Assembly to invest additional funding in this area.

Lastly, the finalized budget contains \$360 million in grant funding for school capital needs. VACo has advocated annually for additional funds in this area of critical need as well as additional tools for localities to raise needed revenues. Though the Governor ultimately **vetoed** legislation that would have expanded school construction financing options to localities across the Commonwealth, continued investments are greatly needed.

Visit Scott County and the Scott County Historic Courthouse

Location: 202 West Jackson Street / Manville Road

Built: 1828 – 1829 Style: Colonial Revival Architect: James Toncray Contractor: James Toncray

Description: The building faces southeast and is a two story red colored brick structure. The building is located on landscaped grounds in the center of Gate City. The southeast front has a large portico with four white colored columns rising to a pediment at the roof line. The recessed entrance has a small pediment above. On the center of the roof is an octagonal white colored cupola with black colored dome. The roof is hipped. The building houses the County Circuit Court, County General District Court and County Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court of the 30th Judicial District. The architect and contractor was James Toncray. An addition was constructed in 1890. In 1929 the portico was added by Pyle Brothers. The north and south wings were constructed in 1968. The wings have flat roof lines. The courthouse is the oldest courthouse in Southwest Virginia.

History: The county was created in 1814 and Gate City was selected as the county seat. The first court met at the home of Benjamin T Hollins in 1815. The first courthouse was built in 1817. The second and present courthouse was built in 1828 to 1829.

Through this program local governments are paid to reduce energy use during peak demand periods, thereby reducing constraints on the electric grid to provide customer power.

2025 Regional Meetings Kick Off in Brunswick County

Brunswick County hosted counties in VACo's Region 4 on April 28 for the first regional meeting of 2025, which featured a lively discussion of shared challenges and legislative priorities. VACo was pleased to be joined at the event by Delegate Otto Wachsmann and representatives from the offices of Senator Luther Cifers and Congressman John McGuire. Delegate Wachsmann provided updates on several of his areas of focus, including ensuring the viability of rural pharmacies and improving care in nursing facilities, and stressed the importance of working together to advocate for rural areas of the Commonwealth.

During a roundtable discussion of county priorities, members shared top issues in their localities, with several issues emerging as common themes, including the need for greater state support for K-12, as well as the importance of additional tools to raise revenues at the local level to address school capital needs; members' strong support for the preservation of local land use authority over the siting of large-scale solar projects; the need for additional transportation funding; and the challenges involved in providing fire and emergency medical services in an era of declining volunteerism and rising costs for equipment. Members also raised concerns about timely permitting by the Department of Environmental Quality, the adequacy of staffing levels recognized by the Compensation Board and the K-12 Standards of Quality, and enforcement mechanisms to counter illegal dumping.

VACo staff provided updates on a variety of recent legislative and budget actions, including a series of bills that would have pre-empted local land use authority over the siting of solar projects and data centers, legislation that would have superseded existing permissive authority for local governing bodies to enter into collective bargaining agreements, and the inclusion of funding in the state budget to functionally eliminate the cap on recognition of support positions in the school funding formula, VACo's top funding priority for the 2025 session. Staff also highlighted provisions in the state budget that impose a cap on state reimbursement for private special education placements funded through the Children's Services Act.

VACo Seeks Input Regarding Proposed Biosolids Regulation



VACo seeks feedback on a draft proposal to allow for "alternative storage" sites for biosolids during prolonged wet weather events.

During 2018-2019, a record-year for precipitation in some parts of the Commonwealth, many biosolids storage facilities reached or exceeded their capacity. "Biosolids" means a sewage sludge that has received an established treatment for required pathogen control and is treated or managed to reduce vector attraction to a satisfactory level and contains limited levels of pollutants, such that it is acceptable for use by land application, marketing or distribution in accordance with the Virginia Pollution Abatement Permit Regulation (9VAC25-32) and the Virginia Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit Regulation (9VAC25-31). In response to this, HB 870 (Bulova) was signed into law last year which requires the state to adopt regulations that include procedures for addressing administrative, staging, signage, and additional on-site and alternative storage site requirements when routine and on-site storage facility capacity and holding times are anticipated to be exceeded for the purpose of protecting against the release of sewage sludge into state waters and to account for increased intensity, frequency, and duration of storm events. The bill directs the Department of Environmental Quality to form a regulatory advisory panel consisting of certain stakeholders (of which VACo is a member) for the purpose of assisting the state in developing the regulations as required by the bill. After the first meeting on April 7, 2025, DEQ staff responded with draft regulation revisions to 9VAC25-32-410 (Biosolids Management Plan) and 9VAC25-32-550 (Storage Facilities).

The proposal allows land applicators of biosolids to submit alternative management plans for a period of time when weather conditions make it impracticable to place material on saturated farm fields. Under the alternative management plan, an applicator may designate sites for "alternative storage" when existing on-site and routine storage sites are at capacity, and …

"Not more than 24 hours prior to delivery of biosolids to an alternative storage site, the permittee shall notify in writing the department and the chief executive officer or designee or the local government where the site is located unless they request in writing not to receive the notice. This notification shall include the site location and the source or sources of biosolids stored."

The draft revisions also require that the biosolids on alternative storage sites be prioritized for removal prior to biosolids stored at on-site or routine storage facilities.

It is important to note that while a locality shall not restrict the storage of biosolids on a farm, as long as such material is being stored solely for land application on that farm, it may by ordinance require a special exception or a special use permit for offsite storage of biosolids on any property in its jurisdiction.

Funding

The Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) program is a nationally competitive program. The \$10M set-aside is specific for Virginia local governments as a result of Hurricane Helene. If the funding is not applied for and used, the funding returns to the federal government and Virginia loses out on that opportunity.

Applications are due to VDEM on May 13, so we want to hear from you now by submitting a preapplication – https://vdem.emgrants.com so we can connect with you. This is a statewide opportunity, but priority and resources will be given to localities in Southwest Virginia that were declared in Helene.

For Application


• VDEM can provide assistance in the general scope of work, budget, and timeline. Local government will need to identify which properties they are including in the application. You should expect requests for information for additional information once the application is submitted. VDEM can continue to support.

For Implementation

• If awarded grant funds, 5% of the award can be used for management costs to oversee the grant project. Implementation of these projects usually takes a few years, so if you do not have the resources in place at this moment – there is a planning window to prepare.

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


Energy Landscape of Virginia Episode 11 | Nuclear Power, Small Modular Reactors, and Fusion. In 2023 nuclear power produced approximately one-third of all power from Virginia sources while representing only 12 percent of all generation capacity in the Commonwealth. Dominion Energy operates Virginia's four nuclear units in plants located in Louisa and Surry counties, each with a capacity of more than 900 megawatts in generation. Each unit operates continuously at capacity, only coming off-line temporarily to refuel approximately every 18 months. 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VAcorp

You are VAcorp

You are not merely a customer of VAcorp; you *are* VAcorp! We are both owned and governed by you – our members! VAcorp is created under 15.2-2700 of the local government code where all assets and surplus belong to the members. In addition, VAcorp is controlled by a Supervisory Board that is elected from and by our members. The Board determines and approves all major risk pool decisions, and as a voting member, you have a voice in the decisions that matter most.

Know Who You Are

Because you are VAcorp itself, we think it is critical that you understand exactly what VAcorp is and why it exists. Many simply think of us as their "insurance carrier" – writing customized coverages and handling claims when they occur – but we are so much more!

Our History

The Birth of Risk Pools

VAcorp is not an insurance company, but rather a Risk Pool.

Unstable economic conditions in the mid-1980s led to a commercial insurance crisis with ballooning premiums and widespread policy cancellations. As a result, Risk Pools began to form as an alternative to volatile traditional carriers, allowing Pool members to exert more control over their coverages and costs. Today, almost all public sector entities throughout the country get their coverage from Risk Pools rather than from commercial insurance companies.

VAcorp's Origin

VAcorp was founded by a handful of Virginia counties in 1993. The ultimate goals of the program were to provide **cost stability**, the most **comprehensive coverages** possible, and **custom services** tailored specifically to the unique needs of our members. While we are pleased by how well our prices compare against the competition, our goal was never to guarantee the lowest cost. Instead, we promised to avoid the wild price swings that we've seen in other providers and provide stable pricing year after year, and that is exactly what we have delivered. VAcorp rates are actually **lower today in 2024 than they were in 1993!**

VAcorp's Growth

Today, VAcorp is the **largest self-insurance risk pool** for public sector entities in the Commonwealth with a membership retention rate of better than 98%. Over the years, we have expanded beyond counties to include municipalities, school divisions, authorities, volunteer fire & rescue companies, state agencies, and non-profits funded by taxpayer dollars. **Over 560 members** have joined VAcorp, including 8 of the 10 largest counties, 8 of the 10 largest cities, and 8 of the 10 largest school divisions. We believe that the extraordinary success of the program can be attributed to our unwavering commitment to our founding principles.

VAcorp Exists to Serve You

VAcorp was created solely to serve Virginia's public sector entities, and from day one until now, we have never lost sight of that purpose. Because we answer only to our members, every decision is designed to benefit the group over the long haul.

VAcorp advocates for local government through a myriad of partnerships with affiliated associations including: VACo, VSBA, VLGMA, VASS, VFGOA, VASBO, LGA, Regional Jail Association, PDC, etc. While there is a cost associated with these partnerships, they add value to the group by aiding in our ability to lobby the General Assembly on behalf of our members.

You may not always see the immediate payoff, but every VAcorp decision is made in alignment with our vision to serve our members and promote the health and longevity of your program.

Take a look at a few of VAcorp's milestones over the years:

- **1993** VAcorp is established with 12 founding members and less than \$700,000 in annual contribution.
- 1998 VAcorp terminates service contract with claims administration vendor and hires staff to promote more control and efficiency.
- 1999 VAcorp offers coverage to K-12 Public Schools across the Commonwealth.
- **2001** VAcorp begins offering Public Officials Liability coverage in response to VArisk offering limited coverage.
- **2004** VAcorp begins providing Environmental Liability coverage to all members at no additional cost. Even in 2024, VAcorp is the only provider offering this coverage with a low \$25,000 deductible. Other providers offer this coverage with a \$250,000 deductible.
- **2008** VAcorp responded to the great recession by freezing rates and providing financial relief with over \$8,000,000 in dividends to members.
- **2011** VAcorp introduces Line of Duty Act (LODA) coverage, creates the only LODA trust in the state, and absorbs existing LODA losses in response to the state pushing this cost to the local level. VAcorp paid all of its members' 2010 past liability for over \$1,000,000.
- 2013 VAcorp merges with the VSBA Self-Insurance Group and assumes their liabilities to prevent School Boards from being assessed. This action saves Local Governments in excess of \$5,000,000.
- **2013** VAcorp becomes the first to offer Cyber Risk coverage in Virginia offering the broadest coverage available to local governments anywhere in the US.
- 2016 VAcorp offers Student Accident and Catastrophic Accident coverage in order to fill VHSL coverage gaps.
- **2020** VAcorp provides over \$5,000,000 in rate credits during the COVID pandemic to assist members.
- 2023 VAcorp includes security risk management coverage (active shooter) for all members (coverage has been included for Schools since 2013).
